

GOVERNOR JOHNSON WAS THERE

Unveiled Bust of Hill, Who Seems to Be Minnesota's Most Highly Honored Exhibit.

[United Press Leased Wire.]
Seattle, Wash., Aug. 3.—The feature of Minnesota day at the exposition today will be the unveiling late this afternoon of a monument to James J. Hill, the great railway builder. Because his life has touch-

ed three countries, the exercises will be international in character. Mr. Hill is a Canadian by birth, an American citizen and large throughly his influence the commerce of the United States was built up with the Orient. Therefore, Americans, Canadians and Japanese will take part in the exercises.

Governor Johnson will pull the cord which will unloose the covering of the bronze bust. The British flag then will be handed to Prime Minister Richard McBride, while the band plays "God Save the King." After the prime minister's address the Japanese flag will be handed to Japanese Consul T. Hanaka, while Japan's national air is played by the band.

Following the consul's remarks the American flag will be passed to Governor Hay, who will deliver an address, after the "Star Spangled Banner" is being played by the band.

A reception will then be given at the Washington State building to Governor Johnson and his wife; Premier McBride, of British Columbia, and Mrs. McBride; Imperial Consul Tanaka and Mrs. Tanaka and the governor of Washington and Mrs. Hay.

DARIUS GREEN AT THE AGE OF 75

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 3.—After ten years of patient labor and sacrifice, Thomas Levi, 75 years old, is today crushed by disappointment because of the failure of his aeroplane to fly. The old man was confident that the machine of his own construction would be a success and Sunday afternoon, in the presence of his neighbors, the initial flight was attempted from the backyard of his home on Beacon Hill. But the little wooden structure failed to ascend and today Levi is grief stricken. He had mortgaged his home to obtain necessary funds to build his machine and had devoted his entire time to the work.

Levi had hoped to prove that an airship could be constructed which would fly without the aid of a motor, one that would go if propelled by man's efforts only. He had dreamed of entering his monoplane in the national airship races at the exposition. The propeller was to be operated in much the same manner by which a bicycle is driven. Down this track the machine was run, but at the end of the rails it fell into the road and the light framework was broken to pieces. The inventor was unhurt, but the work of years was ruined.
