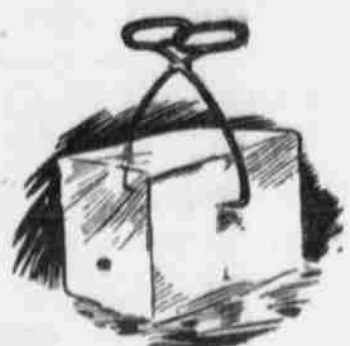

TWO GIRLS KIDNAPED HELD FOR RANSOM

RAILROAD ENGINEER SUSPECTED

John Ryan and George Hopkins
Arrested on Suspicion
of Causing Fires in
Everett.

[United Press Leased Wire.]
Everett, Wash., Aug. 3.—John
Ryan, a former engineer on the Great
Northern railroad, who was, Satur-
day, fined \$50 for turning in a false
alarm of fire, and George Hopkins,
a 19-year-old youth, were arrested
this morning on suspicion of having
knowledge of the origin of the in-
cendiary fires which resulted in a
serious conflagration here last night.
The police refuse to state what evi-
dence, if any, they have against the
pair. The prisoners will be given a
hearing this afternoon.

The total loss resulting from the
series of fires which yesterday after-
noon and last night threatened the
destruction of the city is today placed
between \$175,000 and \$200,000.
More than a dozen buildings, mostly
wooden structures, were consumed by
the flames, which were not brought
under control until after midnight.

reached a line of light and the cave
entrance, and thence walked over the
precipitous mountain to a settle-
ment nearly four miles away.

The sight presented by the unfor-
tunate woman was awful. Smear-
ed from head to foot with blood, her
clothing torn, her hair hanging and
disheveled, the unfortunate woman's
appearance shocked all beholders.

She was brought here yesterday,
a nervous wreck, after a strain of
30 hours, five of which she had
spent in the dark recesses of the cave
watching the life of her husband
ebb away. Her condition is pre-
carious.

Officers say a most gruesome sight
was presented where the body was
found, as the opening through which
he had attempted to enter was bes-
pattered with blood and his brains.
In the fall his skull had been crack-
ed.

The strangest feature of the case,
which cannot be fathomed at this
time, is the action of Vineyard and
the women in not returning to the
cave. After their panic-stricken bolt
from the cave, they notified Joe Fet-
zner of what had occurred. He went
to the nearest telephone and sum-
moned aid, but Vineyard and his
party were so excited and frightened
that they hastened to his father's
ranch at the head of Williams creek
and could not be prevailed upon to
return.
