

These rodents, according to a bulletin of the department of agriculture, immigrated in a flood tide from abroad and have waged continued warfare on the farmers' crops.

Carefully compiled tables show that a single pair of these common brown rats, if allowed to breed uninterruptedly for nine generations, d period of less than three years, will produce 20,155,392 brown rats. The loss caused by one rat at the lowest figure and even allowing that half its food is waste, is 25 per cent per year.
