

SEVENTH WARDERS ORGANIZE

To Contest Legality of Bond Issue on Ground of Election Proceedings.

There was a large meeting of the Seventh Ward Improvement League last night at the Townsend hall to protest in the manner in which the bonding election was conducted Monday.

It was charged that many voters were excluded by failure of voting place to be open in one ward until noon, by failure to erect voting booths according to the Australian ballot law, and that voters were voted in one ward without being registered and their free-holder blanks filled out afterward.

A telegram was sent to the owner

of the park property, the option on which would have expired August 3, but which will now, it is believed, be held until a legal election can be held on the refunding and park bond issue.

The committee on contest proceedings is composed of President John A. Carson of the seventh Ward Improvement League, Aldermen Elliott and Hofer, and Messrs. Johnson and Vass of the league.

League Has Money on Hand.

The entire expense of the park campaign was borne by the league. About \$50 was spent building the street leading up to the park, and by sale of tags enough was realized to have about \$120 on hand. Not a dollar was spent to influence a voter except in an educational way. The league will pay its own expenses of contesting the election and pre-paring another campaign.

No Uniform Election.

In some wards voters were turned away because they were not property owners and men were disfranchised because they had moved to another ward. The judges of election had no rule to go by and there was other discrimination practiced.

NO WATER FOR FIRE VICTIMS

Jap Refugees From Osaka Have Food But Are in Danger of Dying From Thirst.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Tokyo, Aug. 4.—Refugees from the burned city of Osaka are in danger of dying from thirst today. The sufferers are camped along the railway and many of them are in a pitiful plight. The military has been dispatched to their aid. The water supply at Osaka was destroyed during the fire which last Saturday destroyed 12,000 houses and caused property damage amounting to nearly \$0,000,000 yen. Thousands of persons were left homeless by the fire and large refugee camps were established. Food was sent to the sufferers but water is so scarce that the suffering of the people has been terrible.
