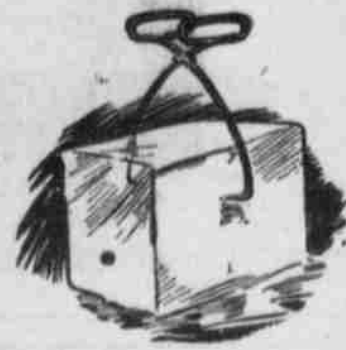

## THE KING TO OWN A CHOP HOUSE

Brussels, Aug. 4.—King Leopold is determined to become a restaurant keeper. He is going to have a Chinese or a chop suey eating house and has sent to China for native cooks and waitresses. He will probably find it rather difficult to secure waitresses, as Chinese women do not readily leave their country.

The king is not going into this venture for personal profit, but will use the money for the establishment of a Chinese museum. He is planning for his country the largest Chinese museum outside of China. It is his opinion that enough money can be made in the restaurant venture in a few months to establish the museum. The building for the restaurant will be the home of the museum. Leopold has secured cooperation of some prominent Chinese, who will help him select objects of art for the museum.

He favors this method of raising funds as an easier method than that of securing subscriptions. He intimates that persons who have money part with it more easily for food delicacies than for art treasures.

#### They Got Fish Anyway—

#### Registered at the Jail—

#### Robbed Sheridan Drug Store—

Sheriff W. G. Henderson of Yamhill county has telephoned to Sheriff Minto and to the state penitentiary for bloodhounds with which to track down robbers who broke into the Sheridan drug store at a late hour last night and carried away jewelry and other articles valued at \$500. Sheriff Henderson says that the fleeing robbers have left a good plain trail and with the assistance of bloodhounds he thinks they could be easily captured. Owing to the sheriff of this county having no hounds and it being against the rule to let the penitentiary hounds go away from that institution, the robbers will probably make good their escape. The robbers entered through a side door of the drug store and after cleaning up everything in sight left the city before daybreak.
