TO BEGIN WORK ON EXTENSION

Following on the heels of the Register's announcement in our previous issue that the contract for the first 25 miles of the Natron-Klamath Falls extension of the Southern Pacific railroad had been let to the Utah Construction Company, came the first official and physical confirmation of the news item. The proof arrived in Eugene yesterday and it was in the form of a group of men who arrived in Eugene on an early train and who after partaking of breakfast at the Smeede hotel, clambered into conveyances and were driven to the right of way of the Natron line, where they

will take note of the contour of the country to be traversed and submit bids for construction of the road. Accompanying the sub-contractors was E. O. Wattis, member of Utah Construction company and his brother L. R. Wattis. Other members of the party are: N. J. Sweeney, W. B. Hunt, W. W. Hunt, W. H. Messenger, G. W. Dye, John Sisson and Ralph Smoot, all of Oroville, Cal., and Dr. O. W. Wipera, Reno; W. A. Bechtel, Pleasanton, and G. S. Coffey of San Francisco.

According to Mr. Wattis, his company has consigned a trainload of construction material to be used in the extension of these materials are expected to arrive on the ground within a very short time. It is the intention of Mr. Wattis' company to put an army of men to work at once on construction at the Natron terminus and employment will be given 2,000 railroaders if that many men are available—Eugene Register.

E. P. SMITH TOURING VALLEY

Edwin P. Smith, a capitalist representing New York owners of the Oregon Electric, is touring the Willamette valley with General Manager Guy W. Talbot, looking over territory for extensions. It is understood his trips will include the larger portion of the valley, and while nothing definite will be determined on at once, it is probable there will be some extensive work done in the near future that will mean the making of a network of electric lines throughout the valley.

HOUNDS TRACKING ROBBERS

Gang That Robbed Fred Haas' Drug Store in Sheridan Said to Be Headed This Way.

Fred Haas, a former drug store man of Salem and well known here, was the victim of the robbery in Sheridan night before last when robbers entered his store and carried away \$500 worth of goods and money.

After committing the robbery the parties went south, and yesterday afternoon Sheriff Henderson of Yamhill county succeeded in getting some bloodhounds, and a posse was organized to pursue them. The last reports of the robbers was that the hounds had traced them to five miles north of Dallas, in Polk county, and the band of men after them are pushing the fleeing men hard. It was also reported this morning that the fugitives were headed toward this city and a close lookout is being kept by authorities between here and Dallas. Although an exact description cannot be obtained of the thieves, they are said to be foreigners, possibly Italians, who had been working in the vicinity of Sheridan recently.
