Mayor Holds Up License—

The liquor license which was passed upon and awarded to E. J. Daly, who was to open up business at the old Elkhead saloon, formerly conducted by Wm. Anderson, is held up by Mayor Rodgers, who refuses to approve the bond. Mayor Rodgers refers to Section 11 of Ordinance 553, in which it limits the number of saloons to the city to the population. The ordinance provides that only one saloon license shall be granted for every one thousand inhabitants in the said city, and owing to Salem's population being only 5,000 people in the last governmental census taken in 1900, another license cannot be granted.

SITUATION IS SERIOUS IN SWEEDN

Employers and Strikers Ask the Government to Let Them Settle Their Own Difficulties.

Stockholm, Aug. 5.—All members of the Sailors' Union quit work today and it is expected that all shipping will be tied up tight.

It is deemed certain that the printers will obey the order and in that case all the newspapers will have to suspend publication.

Stockholm, Aug. 5.—A committee representing the Swedish Employers' Association and the Allied Trades Union today notified the labor minister that they do not want the government to attempt to bring about a conciliation of their differences.

Both sides in the great strike declare that the questions involved must be settled between themselves because a permanent basis of peace cannot be reached in any other way.

In a statement issued today the Employers' Association declared that the chief complaint against the unions was the "Persistent violation of agreements."

With the street car employees and the cabmen out, the public is suffering much inconvenience and the supply of foodstuffs is rapidly diminishing under the effect of the general strike order. The situation is becoming constantly more acute.

The union leaders today declare that the employers conspired to effect a gradual reduction of wages for every class of labor.
