The party went out through the orchard district and will return by the river road to look over the proposed line of the Oregon Electric between Albany and Salem.

## FORBES OF SALEM Y.M.C.A. GOES TO SPOKANE

He enlarged the old building, in fact, built it over, and put in the finest swimming tank in the Willamette valley. From a small membership he pushed the enrollment to 500, and has over 500 people actively interested in Y. M. C. A. work at Salem. The whole institution has been put on a solid basis financially, educationally and spiritually.

Much as they hate to see him go, the members of the local association are going to give him a cordial godspeed in his new work at the big Salem Y. M. C. A. building tonight when there will be a grand reception and farewell handshaking for the man who has made good, and has made a record of which the local workers are proud. 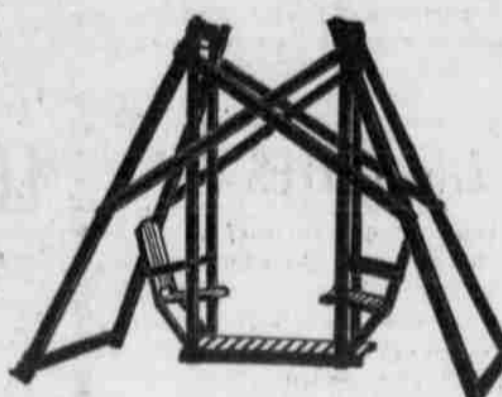

Maud Myrtle Johnson, who was arrested in San Francisco yesterday, charged with being the "Queen of Fakers," was born and raised in this city, she being a daughter of Dan Wagon, formerly a Salem man but of late years a resident of Portland. To recite her history after leaving this city would require a volume, according to her conduct as described by local people. She was married to a man by the name of Bany several years ago and formerly resided in Shedd, Oregon. She parted from Bany shortly afterwards and left a little son, who

is now living with the father's parents at Shedd.

During the past few months, both railroad and city detectives have been searching for Mrs. Johnson here, but what grounds they had to think the woman was in this city is unknown, as she has not been in Salem since her departure for Portland and the east several years ago. In speaking to several residents of Salem who were acquainted with Mrs. Johnson while she lived here it appears as though she showed remarkable shrewdness, although she was not, apparently, of a wayward turn of mind. It is also said that she attempted to sue a Salem man at one time for breach of promise, but there does not appear any rec-

ord of the case in the court dockets to that effect.
