DOCTORS SAY SHE IS SANE

Mrs. Collins Examined Yesterday in Portland—She Will Have to Stand Trial.

Whatever may have been her condition of mind when she shot down her husband, Dr. Roy A. Miles Collins, one week ago Tuesday morning, Mrs. Kate Collins is now both legally and medically sane and must stand trial for murder.

After an examination lasting from shortly after 11 o'clock a. m. until 12:30 p. m. yesterday, the lunacy commission of three local physicians appointed Wednesday by County Judge Webster of Multnomah county to examine her decided unanimously that Mrs. Collins is not now insane. Judge Webster himself sat the examination and concurred with the examination and concurred with the examination and concurred with the examination.

Directly after he was notified of the report of the lunacy commission Deputy District Attorney Hennessy said he would immediately notify Chief of Police Cox to have Mrs. Collins produced in court at the earliest possible moment to answer to the charge against her of murder in the first degree. Her physical condition permitting, Mr. Hennessy said he hoped to have Mrs. Collins arraigned in the municipal court this morning. A date then will quickly be set on which she will appear for trial.

The findings of the lunacy commission that Mrs. Collins is not at present insane will probably have no effect on the stand of the defense that Mrs. Collins was insane at the time Dr. Collins was killed. The

commission's report specifically refers to her mental condition only at the present time and makes no attempt to declare her state of mind two weeks or ten days ago. At that time, and for some time previous to the shooting, Attorney P. L. Willis, Mrs. Collins' lawyer, has stated that she has ample evidence to prove that she was out of her right mind.

THE GREAT LOTTERY IS READY

All Arrangements Completed
for Drawing the Winners
From the 250,000
Registered.

Spokane, Aug. 6.—More interest is manifested in the opening of the Flathead, Washington and Idaho by the government than ever before recorded in the history of land opening in the United States.

The Flathead Indian lands in Montana, the Spokane, Washington, and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, lands have been long sought as prizes of the white man for many years and every effort has been made in the last generation to have them thrown open. That they are eagerly sought is shown by the fact that a total of 274,435 registrations is in. The official figures for the last day up to midnight last night were:

Official figures today at Coeur d'Alene are 194,450.

From Spokane today 4,573; total Spokane, 96,823.

The foregoing figures indicate what have been received at the central registration office at Coeur d'Alene. It is believed that fully 20,000 more applications are in the mails today and that the total registration will reach 290,000 or more.

Platforms from which the drawings will be made have been erected and are now ready. Fifty steel cans which contain the applications are guarded by a picked body of deputies and United States marshals.

On Monday, Miss Helen Hamilton, niece of Mayor Hamilton of Coeur d'Alene, will pick the winning list of 1,500 numbers and on Tuesday will pick a substitute list of three thousand. This latter list will be used to draw from in case any in the first 1,500 do not file upon their lands.

On Thursday, Friday and Saturday the drawing on the Flathead Coeur d'Alene and on Monday, August 16, the Spokane reservation lands will be drawn for at Coeur d'Alene.
