Barber Board Reports—

The eleventh annual report of the state board of barber examiners was turned over to the governor today, showing the financial condition of the board from January 1 to July 1, 1909: Cash on hand January 1, \$874.53. Receipts for renewal of cards, permits and apprentice cards from January 1 to June 30, 1909, \$1,100.25. Total receipts, \$1,974.78. Expenditures from January 1 to June 30, \$1,136.35. Balance, \$838.43. Total expenses of H. G. Meyer, \$217.35; total expense of R. R. Wallace, \$17.65; total expense of T. M. Leabo, \$229.25. Total miscellaneous expenses, \$372.10. Total individual expenses, \$764.25. Cash on hand July 1, \$838.43. The board reports that the law is being observed throughout the state regarding the accommodations and sanitary requirements better than it has ever been before.

IRON FOUNDRY BURNED.

Oregon City Property Damaged to Extent of \$12,000.

Fire practically destroyed the Oregon City foundry yesterday morning at 6:30 o'clock. Patterns valued at \$12,000 were destroyed. J. A. Roake, the proprietor, believes the blaze came from a smoldering fire that was thought to be extinguished yesterday. The building was completely gutted, and much damage was done to the Oregon City iron works in the adjoining building.
