Portland, Or., Aug. 6.—With only the slight caw that two young high-waymen knew their victim, the police today are searching for the assailants of Edwin Campbell, a local capitalist, who was held up last night on Willamette boulevard and robbed of \$890 in money and jewelry. Campbell was near his home at the midnight hour when a youthful

appearing man sprang from behind a tree and leveled a revolver at him at the same time crying: "Hands up."

Campbell thought the affair a joke and playfully grabbed at the revolver. A sharp warning from the footpad told him of his mistake.

At this juncture a second highwayman appeared and a systematic search of Campbell began. Ninety dollars in money was taken from one pocket. A \$150 watch followed the money. Then came a checkbook with a draft for \$900 in it. This

the robbers returned to their victim. Then one of the thugs said: "Don't forget his diamond pin; it's in his tie." That meant exit of a \$650 diamond pin. From the fact that the robbers knew Campbell carried valuable gems the police are working on the theory that the young men are well known to Campbell.

## UNCOVER A FOSSIL "BIRD OF JUNO"

Berkeley, Cal., Aug. 6.—The asphalt beds on the ranch of La Irea has just produced another wonder to the scientific world in the shape of a fossilized peacock. The fossil is the first of its kind discovered on the American continent.

Much interest in the discovery is being taken at the university, where Professor Merriam has announced the finding of specimens of the sabre-toothed tiger, and other primitive forms of animals that were caught in the death trap when they strayed too closely to the oil deposits thousands of years ago, at the same time the peacock became a victim to the black fluid mass.

The name of the fossilized fowl is Pava Californicus. It strongly resembles others discovered in Asia and Europe and the savants acknowledge that to explain its presence in America will be a hard problem.

The specimen belong to a peculiar type and does not resemble the gorgeous representative of the family extant today.

One distinction it possesses is a pair of huge spurs for defensive purposes. Its wings are large and must have been powerful. All the parts of the peacock have not been found. It is expected, however, that the entire specimen will be recovered within two days.

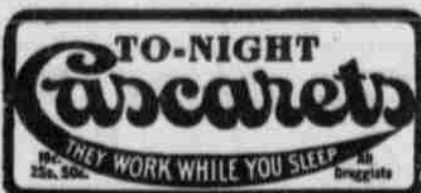
