

GOLD WATCH PRESENTED TO SECRETARY FORBES WHO GOES TO SPOKANE

About 500 Y. M. C. A. people and friends of that organization assembled in a big demonstration last night to give George A. Forbes a farewell and to show appreciation of his splendid service in this community the past two years. BICYCLE RIDERS FORM A PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

Nearly a hundred bicycle riders met at the Y. M. C. A. rooms last night and formed a Bicyclists' Protective association for the purpose of enforcing existing ordinances against scorchers. Watt Shipp was chosen chairman and Frank Moore, secretary. Two persons will be chosen in each ward to be sworn in as special bicycle police to arrest and prosecute those riding in violation of the speed ordinance, which is eight miles an hour.

There were a number of informal talks in favor of more stringent regulation of riders, but the drift of it all was that the people of this city could not do without the walks in winter time at least. E. C. Minton said there must be something done. He himself had collided with Rev. Bauer of the Congregational church. He was in favor of the riders being permitted to use all the walks where there was no hard surface pavements. It was only making it more dangerous for pedestrians too, by forcing all walks on one side of a street. It would be impossible to deliver daily papers without use of the walks for wheels. There was no way for laborers to get to their work mornings and evenings if they could not use the walks at least in the winter time.

C. L. Doty, collector for the telephone company, said he could not perform his work without using the walks in winter at least. Men who made a living on wheels could not get to town if the proposed ordinance was enforced. He thought there should be some regulation to protect the pedestrians against scorchers.

Watt Shipp made the principal address, outlining what was proposed the way of a protective association. There should be twelve or fifteen specials sworn in with power to arrest scorchers.

Adjourned to next Friday night.

Oak Creek, Or., Aug. 7.—Believing his love unrequited, Charles Hendrickson, 25 years of age, today shot and killed his cousin, Miss Iga Erickson, 20 years of age, then turned the 38-calibre revolver upon himself, the bullet entering just below the heart, in the same place where he had shot his cousin. The murderer and his victim died without regaining consciousness.

Eighteen-year-old Ella Erickson and 10-year-old Johnny, sister and brother of the murdered girl, were the only persons in the vicinity of the tragedy, which was enacted at the home of the girl's father, Charles Erickson, at Oak Creek, 12 miles from Roseburg.

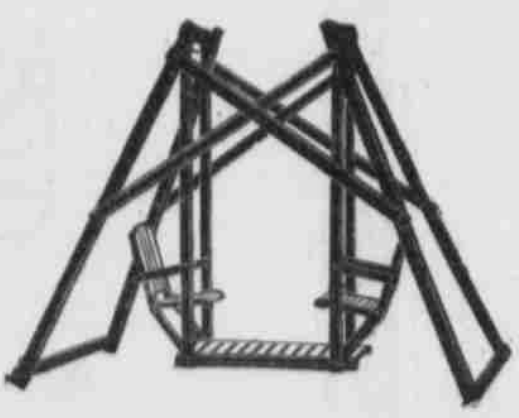

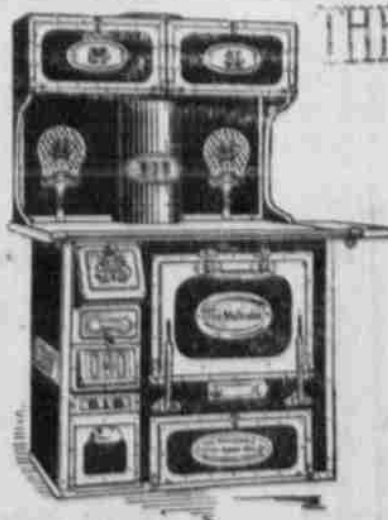

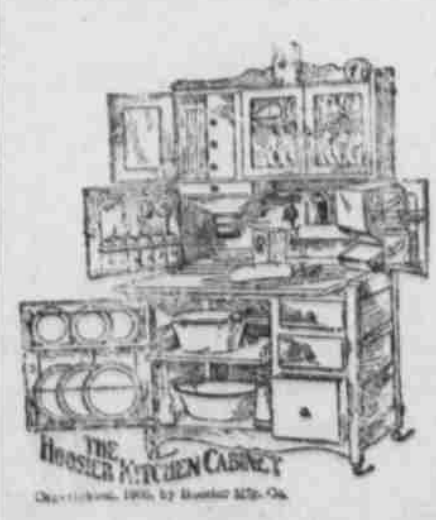
