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COUNCIL LOCKS HORNS OVER IMPROVEMENT OF N. SEVENTEENTH STREET

There was an animated but good natured debate over the improvement of Seventeenth street. Mr. Stolz of the street committee thinks that street should be put through full width and have a heavy coat of gravel or crushed rock, as there will be heavy hauling from the Fair Ground road to Asylum avenue.

Mr. Pressnell raised the point that portions of the street had never been dedicated to the public.

Mr. Millard renewed his petition to have a gravel and crushed rock improvement, but would be satisfied with Mr. Stolz's plan of improvement.

On the final vote the council stood about eight to four for the Stolz resolution.

Mr. Millard moved that warrants be issued to collect liens on property on Seventeenth street for widening said street. Carried.

Mr. Stolz moved that Seventeenth street be improved full width and not less than ten inches of gravel. City engineer to prepare plans and specifications.

Mr. Millard stated a petition to improve that street at not to exceed \$15 per lot and another petition for

gravel and crushed ock. The first petition had not been acted upon by the street committee. There had been no steps taken to collect the liens for widening State street. Before the street could be improved the liens must be collected.

Mr. Hofer said it was a new proceeding for an alderman not living on a street, or even residing in the ward, to propose an expensive street improvement. If an alderman outside of his ward tried to say how a street should be improved, he would kick.

Mayor stated that under section 25 the council could initiate street improvements whether they were petitioned for or not. There was no petition necessary.

Mr. Millard renewed his petition for six inches of gravel and three inches of crushed rock. Referred to street committee.

Mr. Stolz spoke for his motion. The council asked that property owners be protected against too light improvements. Mr. Stolz also explained that his motion was only to have the city engineer make estimates as to cost. His resolution was adopted.

TRADE STREET WHOLESALE DISTRICT

Mr. Hofer introduced an ordinance for side track from Southern Pacific to Salem Brewery Association. Road twice and referred to street committee. Mr. Hofer stated that he hoped this ordinance would bring up the matter of converting Trade street from Front to Twelfth, into a wholesale and manufacturing district. There would be other sidings asked for on that street. With the growth of the city that entire street would be taken up with factories, fruit warehouses and wholesale houses. There would be three or four railroad tracks on the street. At no distant day there would be a bridge across the river at the foot of Trade street. The street committee should have prepared an ordinance to cover the whole matter so that it would not take an ordinance for each siding.

Fine Peach Tree

Mrs. Robert Baisey of South High street has grown from the seed a free-stone peach tree that is bearing great clusters of fine fruit at three years old. The peaches are some of them nearly nine inches in circumference. They are ripening early and will prove a fine addition to the fruit of this valley.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of State Street.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, State street, in said city, from the east line of Twelfth street to the west line of North Mill creek by moving out and establishing the curb lines so the roadway of said portion of State street will be 40 feet in width from curb to curb and by paving the roadway of said portion of said State street full width from curb to curb; provided, however, that those portions of said State street which are intersected by other streets shall be paved for a width of 50 feet along the center of said portions of said State street. There is excepted, however, from the proposed improvement a strip seven feet in width extending the full length of the proposed improvement along the center thereof which is to receive the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, and to be improved at the expense of said company.

Attention is called to the plans and specifications adopted by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder, which shall govern as to the making of said improvement.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.

TEMPORARILY DERANGED SHE ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

While suffering from mental aberration yesterday evening, Mrs. Sarah Davis of Portland attempted suicide by striking herself in the forehead with an ax at the home of her sister, Mrs. Ella Northcutt, at 12th street and Rural avenue.

Mrs. Davis is 35 years of age and was brought to Salem Saturday by her brother, and owing to her displaying symptoms of dementia her sister, Mrs. Northcutt, was compelled to watch her closely. A short time before the injured woman secured the ax she got hold of a razor in some way and was attempting to use it when the deadly implement was wrested from her by Mrs. Northcutt and then she seized the ax with which she seriously lacerated her forehead, but before she could accomplish her purpose the ax was also taken from her and she was then removed to the Salem hospital.

Mrs. Davis rested easily last night and this morning she shows signs of improvement and it is thought she will soon recover. Dr. P. E. Smith is attending her.

COUNT ZEPPELIN RECOVERING RAPIDLY

[United Press Leased Wire.] Stuttgart, Germany, Aug. 10.—Messages received today from Constance sanitarium, where Count Zeppelin was taken for an operation for an abscess on his neck, indicate the published reports that the aeronaut had died in the hospital. Zeppelin is recovering rapidly from the operation which was of a simple character. The message ends with the statement: "Zeppelin is so much alive he probably will make a new airship record within a fortnight."

EVERETT MAN KILLS A WOMAN TENANT

[United Press Leased Wire.] Everett, Aug. 10.—William W. Freestone, a widower aged 49, is a

prisoner in the city jail here today charged with the murder of Mrs. E. M. Ware, a tenant at the former's home. Freestone yesterday shot and killed the woman as she was moving her household effects away. Three other persons in the house were struck by stray bullets and slightly wounded. Freestone was overpowered by S. J. Siglar, a brother of his victim.

Freestone stated after his arrest that he and Mrs. Ware had been engaged and that the woman had jilted him, but insisted that the shooting was due to a quarrel over rent alleged to be due him. Siglar denied this and says the rent was paid to September 1, but that his sister had been so annoyed by Freestone's attentions that she decided to move before her rent expired.

FREIGHT HANDLERS GO OUT ON STRIKE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Port William, Ont., Aug. 10.—Freight shipment is at a standstill here today as a result of the freight handlers strike in the Canadian Pacific sheds. A thousand men walked out yesterday.

The strike came as a surprise to the railroad officials as the men made no formal demands of any sort before the strike was ordered. Higher wages are demanded. Talk of a strike has been heard for some time from the dissatisfied freighters but no action was expected.

SENATORS GO ON JUNKETING TRIP

[United Press Leased Wire.] Chicago, Aug. 10.—United States Senators Tom Carter of Montana, Francis Warren of Wyoming, George E. Chamberlain of Oregon, Frank Flint of California, Thomas Paynter of Kentucky and Wm. Borah of Idaho who comprise the committee on irrigation in the upper house, will leave for an inspection tour of the arid lands in the northwest tomorrow. Leaving Chicago they will make a comprehensive examination of the country from the Rockies to the Pacific, and it is expected that their trip will continue until August 29, when they expect to arrive at Seattle.
