

DRAWING RESERVE LIST TODAY

Coeur d'Alene, Ida., Aug. 10.—In spite of the fact that the drawing today consists of a substitute list of names to be used in case those drawn yesterday fail to qualify, the drawing today caused nearly as much enthusiasm as was shown at the opening yesterday.

Judge Witten, who has charge of the drawing, said today that hundreds of applicants would be disappointed owing to the fact that considerably more names have been drawn than there are claims to be distributed. All persons below the number of 1,200 will be entitled to make entry on the Coeur d'Alene lands. Those drawn above the number today will be placed on a reserve list to make entry by default if given an opportunity.

Only a few persons in the east were lucky enough to draw within the limit of 1,200. A few more are registered from the middle west, but most of the numbers drawn were for persons living in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The close of the drawing is expected this afternoon, when 3,000 names will have been taken from the boxes.

ELEVEN REPORTED BURNED

Vernon, B. C., Aug. 10.—A fire broke out in the Okanagan hotel here about 2 o'clock this morning, resulting in the total destruction of the building and the loss of lives of eleven of the guests of the house. The building, which was of brick veneer and three stories in height with about 50 rooms, was a seething mass of flames by the time the fire alarm was turned into the fire station. Both the back and front stairways were on fire before the firemen arrived on the scene of the holocaust and the guests were escaping from the burning building down the fire escape or at the rear, where the roofs of some outhouses made their descent less hazardous. Only by the most strenuous efforts on the part of the firemen was the fire confined to the one building which is situated on the main street and surrounded by prominent business houses. The premises of the Royal Bank of Canada, the Bonyas Company, Morris drug store and F. A. Lovelidge real estate office were considerably damaged. Up to the time of this dispatch eleven bodies have been removed from the smoldering ruins and a search for more is being carried on.

EXPOSES SCHEMES (Continued from Page 1)

Collins was the United States registrar of lands at Helena under Grover Cleveland. Now he is the power trust's man.

Ballinger was United States land commissioner under Roosevelt, and is now President Taft's secretary of the interior.

All the countries of Europe and the islands of the sea have for years and some for centuries, conserved the national land, water and forests. Ten years ago Canada put into effect a comprehensive system of laws to protect timber and water and land. It remained for Roosevelt to bring the American people to their senses in regard to conservation of timber land and water power. Of all the beneficent activities of the Roosevelt administration nothing stands out more conspicuously than Roosevelt's determined effort to conserve for the people and their children the enormous undeveloped wealth of the great west.

It remains to be seen whether Ballinger deliberately attempted to destroy Roosevelt's good work and did re-open Montana lands in the especial interests of his friends, Carter, Collins and others, or whether he simply did not realize the importance of his acts, or was betrayed by his friends. It remains to be shown why Senator Tom Carter did what he did. However, this may be stated positively:

The lands have been seized—boldly taken from the public—and Roosevelt's midnight work during his last hours of office has, to this measure, been undone.

Who is responsible? The final answer may come from President Taft.

The Amalgamated Copper company with power sites secured since Roosevelt left office is now in absolute possession of the Missouri river from Three Forks in southern Montana to the alkali plains west of Great Falls. This river holds probably the most valuable water power sites in the nation. These, all in the hands of the trust, give to it complete power to shut out competition for all time, and force every home, farm and factory within an area of 4,000 square miles to pay tribute to formed Senator W. A. Clark, the Guggenheims and their associates.

On June 11 last there was filed at the United States land office at Bozeman, Mont., an entry on the 15,868 acres of land that clinched the monopoly. This entry was made for the United Missouri River Power company, a New Jersey corporation capitalized at \$10,250,000. This corporation was promoted by ex-Senator W. A. Clark of Montana and his associates, H. T. Hauer, 49 Wall street, New York, who are the leading spirits in Amalgamated Copper.

Like all New Jersey corporations, it has eternal life. It was organized as a merger of the Missouri River Power company and the Helena Power Transmission company.

It may be merely a coincidence that this merger company was incorporated in New Jersey at the time that the retirement of Garfield indicated a possibility of the breaking down of the Roosevelt conservation policy in Montana.

These entries were made by Jeremiah Collins, land agent of the power trust, with offices in Washington and Helena. Much of the land was entered in the name of George L. Ramsey, president of the United Bank and Trust company of Helena. I inquired at the United Bank as to whether Ramsey would sell any of these lands.

"Oh, these lands do not belong to Mr. Ramsey," replied Samuel McKenna, treasurer of the bank. "Mr. Collins simply uses his name for convenience. You will find many entries in Mr. Ramsey's name, but he has no interest in them."

Besides using the names of Ramsey, Collins also masked his operations behind two corporations of his own, known as the Riverside Land and Livestock company and the Collins Land company. Operating through these various agencies, Collins was able to buy up much power sites as had already fallen into private hands, and to seize those remaining in government ownership.

The other branch of the power trust in Montana is the group centering in the General Electric company. The General Electric controls all the power sites in Montana on the Jefferson, Gallatin and Madison rivers. By agreement the General Electric took this and left the headwaters of the Missouri for the Amalgamated crowd. Together they form the power trust.

But after all there is perhaps only one thing that Helena wonders at. That is, why it was that, though President Taft warned Ballinger on April 30, some of the Montana lands were not withdrawn until as late as June 26 and Collins got what the trust needed on June 11?

TWELVE THOUSAND KILLED

Spanish Newspaper's Estimate of Losses in Morocco War and Barcelona Uprising.

Lisbon, Portugal, Aug. 10.—Twelve thousand Spaniards lost their lives in the recent fighting in Morocco and the uprising at home, according to today's issue of *Diario de Noticias*, which has made reliable estimates, including the persons executed at Barcelona and elsewhere by the government. The paper says the country is still in grave danger of a revolutionary movement sweeping over the entire kingdom.

ANOTHER RAILROAD ACROSS CONTINENT

Chicago, Aug. 10.—It was announced that the last gap in the Pacific coast extension of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway would be closed August 15, when local passenger train service will be established between Butte, Mont., and Malden, Wash., on the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound railway. Through passenger service is now in effect with standard equipment between St. Paul and Minneapolis and Butte and with the completion of this gap the new line will reach the coast without a break.
