Close Call for a Fire—But for the quick action of the Salem fire department yesterday afternoon the Tillson feed store on High street would have, in all probability, been burned to the ground, together with the adjoining buildings, which are closely connected with the large wooden structure. A cigarette was dropped in a bale of oat hay by some one, which ignited the dry straw and the bale began to smoulder. The employees of the store were in the front part and the smell of burned hay reached them and the fire was soon discovered. The fire department was called immediately and a few seconds later the blaze was put out. Had the fire reached a pile of loose hay which was lying in close vicinity of the burning bale another bad fire would have been recorded for Salem.

Out on a Technicality—For the failure of Judge George Burnett to convene court on the first of the three days interim not covered by Governor Chamberlain's proclamation in Linn county, J. H. Turpin, convicted of a statutory crime, was turned loose in an opinion handed down by the supreme court today.

## ELECTRIC CAR HITS DELIVERY WAGON

George Stenstrom, a regular deliveryman for the Weller Bros' grocery, accompanied by George, 10-year-old son of Charles S. Weller, was driving along Marion street west when he started to cross the Oregon Electric track on High street. He did not notice the 5:45 electric car approaching until he had driven the horse onto the tracks and then he evidently became confused and lost control of the horse, which stopped on the track directly in front of the on-coming car. Seeing the immediate danger, however, he called to George to jump and he then did likewise. The older boy succeeded in landing on his feet safely, but George struck the ground with much force, bruising him painfully. The big car, which was in charge of Motorman Fred Westbrook who was quick to realize the danger, struck the rig and turned it over, horse and all, shattering one wheel, and stopped a few feet further on. Westbrook at once jumped from his car and went to the side of the Weller boy, who was crying with pain, and tried to find out if any serious injury had resulted. The injured boy was taken to the home of Col. J. Olmsted, where Dr. W. H. Byrd, who was on the car at the time, examined the lad but it was found that no bone were broken, but the little fellow was badly shaken up. Stenstrom escaped injury with the exception of a few bruises.

Motorman Fred Westbrook is one of the most careful and trustworthy of the Oregon Electric employees and there is no blame attached to him whatever, and he deserves great credit for bringing the heavy car to a stop as soon as he did. Before Motorman Westbrook had brought his car up to the crossing on Marion street he sounded his going loudly as a warning, and when he saw the rig drive up he pulled the whistle cord several times.

From last reports the Weller boy was resting easily.
