SUSPECTED OF MURDER AND ARSON

Sacramento, Aug. 11.—James Cook, a cook, is held in the tanks of the Sacramento jail on suspicion of having killed Mrs. Carrie Breslan, with whom he lived for two years past, then burned their house to cover the crime at 11 o'clock last night.

To the police he has told contradictory stories and denied that he was home after 7 o'clock in the evening. He was arrested in a saloon four blocks from the scene of the fire at an early hour this morning.

The arresting officer's first question to him was:

"Did you know there was a fire last night?"

Cook's answer was:

"Do you think I set that fire and burned my own clothes?"

Later at the police station he denied all knowledge of the fire. The police have found witnesses who heard the couple quarreling a short time before the fire. The body was too badly burned to find any marks upon it.

Mrs. Breslan and Cook had been living together about two years. According to Mrs. H. Patton, mother of the dead woman, Cook had threat-

ened to kill her and had beaten her many times in the past. Mrs. Breslan was the divorced wife of a well known employment agent here.

Cook is a young man, the son of R. E. Cook, a well known Southern Pacific employe of this city.

Seattle, Aug. 11.—Final arrangements for the entertainment of the Japanese business men and the women who accompany the party, soon to visit this country, have just been completed by the entertainment committee of the chamber of commerce.

The program as finally determined follows:

On the evening of September 2 the trade experts of both the United States and Japan will organize. The following morning they will investigate the commercial situation of States and Japan will organize. The spent at the exposition. In the evening a banquet will be given by the Rainier club.

The contest will be open to the feminine beauty of the whole world. No one except the exposition management will know who the judges are and the persons who compete for the prize will do so unconsciously. Beauty of face, intelligent expression, grace, appropriateness of costume, gentility of manner, attractiveness of person and sweetness of disposition will each be considered by the judges in making up their decision.

AN AUTO MANIAC IN TROUBLE

Ralph K. Leavitt Must Answer Charge of Manslaughter for Running Down Sweeper.

Sacramento, Aug. 11.—Ralph K. Leavitt, capitalist, will have to return to Seattle to stand trial for manslaughter, as E. C. Cooper, private secretary to Governor Gillette granted the requisition desired by the Washington officials this morning. Mr. Cooper acted upon a written opinion from Attorney General Webb to the effect that the complaint against Leavitt was legally drawn.

Leavitt is in Los Angeles, but has not been under arrest during the time that his extradition has been in doubt. He has fought the proceedings in an effort to avoid facing the charge.

The charge of manslaughter was placed against Leavitt as his automobile had run over and killed a street sweeper of Seattle. Leavitt was in the machine, which, it is alleged, was being driven by his private chauffeur at a high rate of speed.

NEGROES LOOTED THE TOWN

While Monticello Was Burning Looting Began—Armed Posse Drove Robbers Away.

Port Jervis, N. Y., Aug. 11.—A posse of citizens clashed with a band of negro looters today following a fire that practically wiped out the business section of Monticello, a Sullivan county resort. The looters were driven out of the town after several shots had been exchanged.

The fire was stopped by the use of dynamite, but the loss is estimated at half a million dollars. When the fire was at its height and the people had fled in terror, the negroes seized upon the opportunity to enter residences and steal whatever they could lay their hands on. The posse was formed by white men and after arming themselves went back into the burned district and attacked the looters, putting them to flight.

Among the hotels destroyed were the Bolsum house, the Palatice hotel and the Rockwell house. In all over 30 buildings were destroyed. Many of the persons who suffered losses were residents of New York city, here for the summer.

CHICAGO STILL IN DANGER OF STRIKE

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Presidents Hullin and Buckley of the local street car unions said today that unless the differences between the men and the companies are settled within 36 hours there is grave danger of a walk-out.

The men are becoming restless and dissatisfied at the delay. The union officials fear that they will be unable to control the situation unless something definite is done promptly.

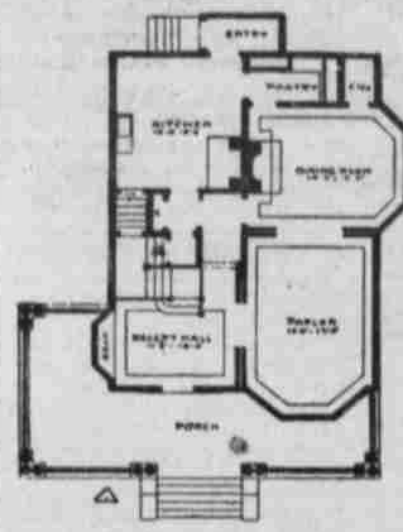
A Stately Colonial.

Interior Pleasing and Well Laid Out—Estimated Cost, About \$3,000.

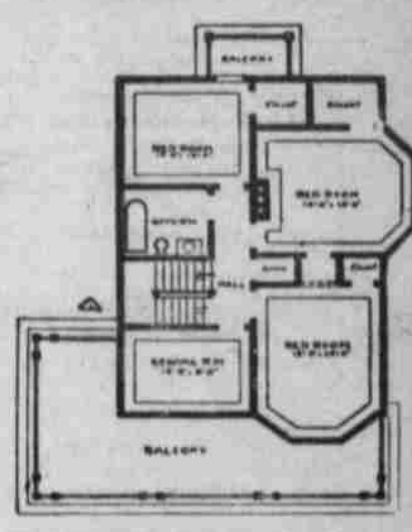
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PERSPECTIVE VIEW—FROM A PHOTOGRAPH.

This design makes an exceptionally fine colonial home, rich and effective in appearance. The interior arrangement is well laid out, both for comfort as well as pleasing effect. There is a grandeur about this house not always found in more costly houses. Note the reception hall with its nook, seat and fine staircase. First floor is trimmed in local hard wood and finished natural, except the parlor, which is enameled. Second floor trimmed in soft wood and finished natural. Two rooms finished in attic. First story ten feet high; second nine feet high; cellar seven feet high, with laundry under kitchen. The stairs to the laundry are under the main stairs, but lead from the lobby between hall and kitchen. Full modern plumbing throughout. The house is heated with steam, and all walls and ceilings are plastered with three coats of plaster. Cost about \$3,000. Size 28 by 36 and ten foot porch.
