

MILLIONS OF SALMON ARE CAUGHT

And Other Millions Are Swarming Past the Filled Traps Will Reach Spawning Grounds.

Bellingham, Wash., Aug. 11.—All salmon records were broken yesterday when, with half of the traps lifted or filled with fish, the gill netters and purse seiners abandoning the work because they cannot dispose of their catch, 2,234,000 sockeye salmon were received at Bellingham, Blaine, Anacortes and Fraser River canneries.

Canners are now making no effort to pack the whole catch, contenting themselves with speeding the machines and cannery workmen up to the highest point and running for the whole 24 hours without stopping. Prices have fallen to a point where seiners and netters cannot afford to fish, even if they could dispose of their catch.

Independent trap men are raising their traps. Canners are only packing the fish taken in their own traps. Buyers are here from Columbia and Fraser river canneries, and carload after carload of salmon are loaded direct from scows, iced and dispatched in trainloads. Astoria, Or., is securing hundreds of thousands of fish here.

At Blaine, on the international boundary, counting of fish has been discontinued by trap men and canners, scow loads only being tallied. Here thousands of tons of fish will go to waste while the herds of salmon are passing lifted or filled traps and make their way to the Fraser unhindered. With the run at its maximum at Blaine, it is believed the tail of the run has reached the lower traps and salmon banks.

WHAT THE O. A. C. PURPOSES DOING

In the biennial election of officers of the Oregon agricultural college at Corvallis Saturday, J. K. Weatherford, Albany, was re-elected president; E. E. Wilson, Corvallis, secretary; B. F. Irvine, Portland, treasurer; T. J. Apperson, Park Place; A. T. Buxton, Forest Grove; J. K. Weatherford, E. E. Wilson, executive committee.

President Kerr was instructed to establish at the college a seed testing laboratory to be conducted in cooperation with the bureau of plant industry of the United States department of agriculture. The purpose of the laboratory is to save the large waste due to the use of imperfect seeds and to secure larger crop yields through use of seeds of demonstrated germinating value.

An offer by private parties to finance the chief cost of conducting horticultural co-operative work in the Medford district was referred to a special committee for investigation, and report at a meeting to be held in September.

The Eastern Oregon dry farm experiment station to be conducted in cooperation with the federal government, under an act of the late legislature, was located at Moro, Sherman county.

LAWYER RUNS AWAY TO DO MANUAL LABOR

[United Press Leased Wire.] Kenosha, Wis., Aug. 11.—Judge Clarkson, who disappeared three weeks ago and who was found by relatives working as an unskilled workman in a button factory 200 miles away from his home, gratified his yearning for manual labor today by becoming the employee in the lacquer room of the Simmons Manufacturing company.

Before taking up his new labors Clarkson announced the dissolution of the new law partnership he had formed with Robert Baker.

While laboring Clarkson said that he intends to study to become an Episcopal minister.

Clarkson's case has attracted widespread interest. Twice within the last eighteen days he has disappeared from his home to do the work of a day laborer. When found he explained the desire by the statement that "something drives him" to manual labor.

Clarkson has enjoyed a large law practice and has been on the superior bench. He is reputed to be wealthy.

INDIANS SEEK REDRESS.

Chief No-Shirt Will Carry Complaint to Washington.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 11.—As a result of a council of the Walla Walla and Cayuse Indians on the reservation, Chief No-Shirt, of the Walla Wallas, will leave in a few days for Washington to present some grievances to the Indian department.

The Indians object to the opening of roads across the reservation for the benefit of the white stock men, who otherwise would be compelled to go a hundred miles out of their way in going to and from their summer ranges. The chief says he knows the government did not order the roads opened, or they would have been fixed up long ago.

The Indians also declare that many of the Indians were not given the money due them, at the time the last payment of Indian money was made. They feel that the agents have been working against them in the interest of the local banks. The last payment was made by Major McPartridge just before he stepped out.

DEPARTMENT GETS A MOVE ON ITSELF

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, Aug. 11.—At the direction of Secretary of the Interior Ballinger, Assistant Secretary Wilson said yesterday that 1,222 acres of land in the lower Yellowstone and 4 268 acres in the Hellgate river district, both in Montana, were withdrawn from entry as power sites. It was announced that the withdrawals were made in order that congress may preserve the water power sites from monopolies. Under the same conditions, 1,160 acres on the Judith river, Montana, and 240 acres on Ashley creek, Utah, were withdrawn later in the afternoon.
