SUIT OVER PRATUM OIL WELL

Showing Was Good But Parties Were Unable Financially to Continue the Work.

According to a complaint filed in the circuit court this morning, it is evident that the Pratum oil wells, commonly known as the Willamette Valley Oil company, has struck hard lines. The title of the complaint is Fred J. Rice vs. the Willamette Valley Oil company, and it is a suit to recover \$1,500 by the sale of the property on which the complainant has a mortgage. The complaint alleges that some time ago the business managers, W. A. Leet and C. W. Taylor, secured a loan of \$1,500 from the Ladd & Bush bank in this city, and after it was long overdue Rice paid off the note and took a mortgage on the property. After a short time following the taking over of the mortgage the business managers of the oil wells, Leet and Taylor, decamped, leaving the property, consisting of valuable machinery, unprotected. It is asked that a receiver be appointed by the court, which was done, C. O. Rice being selected for the position, and that the property be sold to satisfy the mortgage by the sheriff.

These oil wells are located at Pratum, Or., a few miles east of this city, and for a time much interest was taken in their development. The machinery installed on the property consists of engines, boilers and cables, including drilling machines and other valuable machinery used in boring the wells. The promoters succeeded in obtaining good results at the start, but owing to financial inability to keep the work going results have been lacking for some time.

Attorneys Caron and Brown are appearing as counsel for the plaintiff.

WANTED SITE FOR FACTORY

The Salem board of trade had its monthly meeting last evening and closed arrangements for another factory for the capital city. Messrs. Gleason & Son of Seneca, Kansas, have perfected arrangements to locate here and open a cloth glove and mitten factory. The board of trade will become helpful in the matter of securing a site and making other concessions to induce the location. The executive committee was empowered at the meeting to negotiate the deal and they are busy today looking up locations. Anyone having a desirable site to offer would do well to communicate promptly with Secretary Hofer of the board of trade, who will submit all propositions to the proper parties.

SENATOR FORCED TO ACT

Senator Booth Asks to Be Excused on Grounds He Is Convinced Schively Is Guilty.

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 12.—The senate just before noon today voted to force Senator Robert Booth of King county to sit in the impeachment proceedings after a long and, at times, bitter debate. Booth submitted a letter asking to be excused from the oath and sitting, stating that he was convinced of Schively's corruption and that no evidence could change his opinion. He was therefore disqualified from acting as a judge.

Five senators—Huxtable, Freedy, Smith, Williams and Rath—voted to excuse Booth. The others turned the request down and to show the bitter feeling aroused insisted that Booth leave the senate chamber until he had made up his mind whether or not to take the oath.

During the morning session the senators wrangled some time over the hours to be observed during the trial and finally decided to be in session from 9 o'clock to noon and from 1:30 to 5 o'clock daily, with no night sessions.

On the house side the Duwamish improvement bill came up as a special order. So many attacks were made on the attempt to bring the bill to an immediate vote that the friends of the measure feared it would be killed and so permitted the bill to be made a special order for this afternoon and then took a recess until 2:30.

The senate listened to the argument of Attorney General Bell against Schively's demurrer and motions to dismiss the charges just before taking the noon adjournment.

TO FIGHT BUBONIC PLAGUE

Seattle, Aug. 12.—If the wishes of Seattle's most representative business men are heeded the campaign that has been so vigorously waged for the past three years to keep the bubonic plague out of this city will be continued.

Representative business firms and heavy taxpayers to the number of about 200 have petitioned the city, through Commissioner of Health Crichton, to continue the appropriations to enable the department to proceed with the warfare against rats and to take other preventive measures.

Should the case at Portland now under investigation by Dr. Chapin, United States government plague expert, prove to be bubonic plague, as reported, Dr. Crichton stated today that most strict precautions, including inspection and fumigation of vessels from Oregon, would be observed.
