FIFTY YEARS OF COAL OIL

An Exchange Makes a Few
Comments on What Pe-
troleum Has Done
for the World.

Fifty years ago this summer a man named Drake bored for oil near Titusville, Pa., and struck it. That was the first oil well in the world. Millions of people have used oil increasingly ever since, but not one of a million of them ever gave a thought to that man who had faith, the courage, the "sense," to drill down into the earth for oil. How did he guess it was there? By what spark of knowledge was he animated? He blazed the trail. What would the world have done during the last 50 years without "petroleum," "kerosene"? It is a curious substance, this oil that has made a hundred multi-millionaires, with Rockefeller at their head, and illuminated the world. Petroleum we get from the books is purer than any animal fats; no microbes can enter into or exist in it. And now Rockefeller and company say they can make a sort of butter out of it that will do very well for the multitudes of us who are not millionaires and who haven't the ability to organize great industries. It may be so. It is not safe to deny anything. We may be eating petroleum butter soon; we'll have to eat what the trust allows us. Only 50 years ago since "Colonel" Drake, inspired by a great, true idea, bored for oil! The people laughed at him; called him crazy, but think of the millions, billions of the employment it has given; of the dollars that oil since then has represented. Of the lives it has changed; education it has helped; of the industries it has founded. It is a tremendous story.—Journal.

WOOD WASTE DECREASING

The waste wood heap continues to diminish and pass away, says a government bulletin.

A Massachusetts manufacturer of brushes recently made a discovery in Maine which supplied him with material exactly suited to his purpose. He went to the Pine Tree State to buy wood for the back of hair brushes and handles of shaving brushes, and chanced to visit the yards of a spool maker who was using white birch. The spool man took the white part of the wood only, and was throwing away the red heart. Thousands of cords had been burned or dumped in the lake to be rid of it.

The red hearts were exactly what the brush maker wanted, and at little more than the expense of freight he supplied his factory.

This is typical of the trend of manufacturing. Waste of wood is still great, but it is decreasing. What one factory can not use, another turns to profit. Formerly mills threw away half the forest—tons left in the woods, sawdust dumped in streams to pollute them and destroy fish, slabs burned in perpetual bonfires, and defective logs and low grade lumber abandoned as not worth moving.

This policy does not generally prevail now. Some mills have put in machinery to work up their own by-products, others sell their waste to manufacturers who can use it, as in the case cited in Maine. The properties and uses of woods are now subjects of careful investigation, and the problem of turning to account the odds and ends and the by-products is brought more to the front now than formerly.

The United States forest service has taken up this study in a comprehensive and systematic way. Investigations of the woods of particular states are being conducted, usually in co-operation with the states concerned. The plan, when fully carried out, will include every commercial wood in the United States, not fewer than 200 species. The properties of each will be investigated, its hardness, toughness, fuel value, size of tree, regions where grown, the common names by which it is known in different localities, and other matters of the kind. A history of the wood's uses in the past will be given, and an account of present uses, together with suggestions for a wider range of usefulness in the future by pointing out in what capacities it will serve best and be most valuable.

TO CLOSE THE NORTH END DIVES

Mayor Simon Says Women
Must Move, But That They
Cannot Be Driven
From City.

Portland.—"The women must move out of the north end. There can be no restricted district there. I never did think that was the place for the undesirable. I have not as yet issued any specific instructions to Chief of Police Cox, but he has been acting with authority from me and knows that I will not have vice flaunted in the face of the public as it has been across the deadline for the past week, according to press reports."—Mayor Simon.

The mayor this morning announced for the first time his opinion that the north end is not the locality that should shelter the vice dens, but when asked in what quarter of the city he thought the women should be allowed to pursue their calling he only replied that he could not say—that he had not given the matter any thought, the women must decide the question themselves.

"I am sorry this agitation should have been started again. I dislike to have the evil made worse by the light of publicity," went on the mayor, "but we cannot rid the community of it and we cannot tie the denizens up in sacks and throw them in the river, either. The municipal league has among its membership, I think, some very impracticable people. I have not heard any suggestions from them as to how we can remedy the evil."

"I think much of the discussion has arisen from the fact that grafters have sought to reap a profit from the subservience of the fallen and I will not countenance this pernicious form of plundering the helpless because of their outcast position in society."
