

PUT OFF INVESTIGATION OF SUPREME COURT

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 15.—The work of the Halsey committee, appointed by the house of representatives to investigate charges against the supreme court, has come to a halt. It was announced today that no further steps would be taken in the inquiry until the committee has received instructions from the house. A statement will be prepared and presented to the house shortly, and if further investigation is desired, enlarged powers will be asked. The

committee is not ready to report on the result of its work.

Dr. Eugene Jordan, who was charged by P. F. Morrow, a Seattle attorney, and other witnesses with displaying a typewritten document purporting to be an opinion of the supreme court in a case at bar in advance of its public announcement, was called before the committee last night. He was questioned broadly concerning his connection with the Sullivan will case, but his testimony did not throw any light on the case and he was excused from further attendance.

MYSTERIOUS AIRSHIPS GOOD OLD PLANETS

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—The 48-hour mystery of the "airship" seen swinging across the skies by residents of the cities in the vicinity of San Francisco bay has been cleared up by R. Tracy Crawford, professor of astronomy of the University of California.

According to Crawford the lights of the "airship" are removed forty and four hundred and fifty millions of miles away respectively, as one of the "airship" lights is Venus and the other Jupiter.

For the past two days reports of a mysterious airship sailing through the skies at a height from the ground variously estimated at from 200 to 500 feet, has been reported from a number of coast and southern cities. Much excitement over the strange craft arose. In the light of Crawford's statements seemingly there is a confusion between things astronomical and aeronautical.

BERGER SAYS HE HAD AUTHORITY

[United Press Leased Wire.] Chicago, Aug. 13.—Sam Berger is still unconcerned today over Jim Jeffries' statement that he was not authorized to enter into an agreement on behalf of the ex-bollermaker for a fight with Jack Johnson.

"I had complete authority to sign the articles," said Berger, "and I did not overstep it. The only mistake I may have made was in not holding out for a larger side bet. Jeffries wanted to make it \$10,000 a side, but Johnson objected to this amount and rather than give Johnson an opportunity to slide from under I agreed to make it \$5,000 a side. I believe Jeffries has been misinformed."

The permanent stake-holder has not yet been named.

LAND DRAWINGS ARE ABOUT FINISHED

Coeur d'Alene, Aug. 13.—Drawing for lands in the Flathead Indian reservation at Missoula, Mont., continued today and it is expected that the last of the numbers will be drawn tomorrow afternoon. This will dispose of approximately 2,800 claims, for which 6,000 applications will be drawn.

The crowd attending the drawing was of smaller proportion than that of yesterday and less interest was shown as the white envelopes were taken from the boxes. Preparations are being made already for the drawing for the few claims in Spokane reservation, will take place here next Monday. Only 250 numbers will be drawn.
