

MONEY UNDER HIS BED

Jacob Schaerer, Who Committed Suicide at Hillsboro, Left Small Fortune. No Relatives.

A dispatch from Hillsboro last night says: Members of the coroner's jury that investigated the death of Jacob Schaerer, the Bethany blacksmith who committed suicide yesterday after having been arrested on an assault charge, found a cache of \$3600 in gold under the bed in the dead man's house. The money, which was packed in cans that showed signs of having been recently dug from the ground, was in coins of \$20, \$10, and \$5 denomination. It was brought to Hillsboro this morning and deposited with the county treasurer. The money was found by jurors who were looking over the house last night after the coroner and sheriff had departed. With the money were found papers and memoranda that showed he had lost all his savings.

amounting to \$2000, in a bank failure in Bellingham, Wash., in 1893, and that the cash in the cache, as well as \$236.48 found in his shop, had been earned and saved since that time and hoarded in cans, as he was distrustful of banks. No will was found in the dead man's effects. Schaerer was 47 years old and had no relatives in this section. His father is dead, and his mother is believed to be living in Switzerland. He had a brother in this country, but he was drowned in the Heppner flood. The blacksmith has been in Oregon seven years, working at Scholls before coming to this locality. Besides the money found, Schaerer owned 10 acres of land.

MARTIAL LAW IN ONTARIO

Two Hundred Regular Troops Sent to Fort William to Control the Rioting Laborers.

Fort William, Ont., Aug. 13.—Two hundred regular troops stationed at Fort Osborne started for Fort William today because of the serious rioting which has been in progress here since the dock laborers employed by the Canadian Pacific railroad went on strike a week ago for higher wages. The city is under martial law for the first time in its history. Troops are attempting to quell the outbreaks of the thousand striking laborers, most of whom are Greeks, Hungarians and Italians.

When twenty-four special police of the railroad force under Chief Ball arrived from Winnipeg yesterday to protect the company's property the strikers began a riot during which a score were wounded, including Chief Ball, who is not expected to recover, and two others whose injuries are pronounced fatal. Mayor Pelletier has turned the policing of the city over to the militia and troops are patrolling the streets today waiting the arrival of the regulars.

PROVES A FINE FLYER

C. F. Willard in Curtiss Bi-Plane Makes Most Perfect Flight Yet Made by an Aeroplane.

Mineola, L. I., Aug. 13.—C. F. Willard, in the Curtiss bi-plane "Red Bug," today sailed twelve miles in nineteen and a half minutes, over three towns and rough country, where descent would have been practically impossible, making a flight in certain respects the most wonderful ever accomplished by a machine heavier than air.

Willard started from Mineola at 5:30 o'clock this morning, the bi-plane rising beautifully like a bird and sailing away, moving at the will of the aviator. He made two turns around Hempstead Plains and then started toward Garden City. He was not familiar with the country over which he flew, not having examined it or made any investigation before the flight.

When Willard reached Garden City he was about 150 feet high. He passed over that town with the machine working beautifully. Then he crossed over Westburg and Hicksville. During nearly the entire flight he was over woods, houses or other obstructions that would have worked disaster if he had attempted to descend. At five different points he passed over telegraph wires and crossed eight public roads. When he reached the motor parkway he made three circuits of the course.

Willard intended to try to break the world's record for endurance and cross-country flying, but he found that his magnet was working badly and decided to return, abandoning the attempt for the present. When he brought the bi-plane to the earth he appeared to have it un-

MISSING MAN WAS ONLY LOST

Supposed to Have Fallen Over Cliff, but Walks Into Camp Today — Searching Party Still Out.

McCloud, Cal., Aug. 13.—Gus Mauer of Vacaville, who was believed to have perished while attempting an ascent of Mount Shasta and for whom searching parties have been scouring the mountain since Tuesday, walked into McCloud last night.

Mauer said that after leaving his companions he lost his way while attempting to return to camp. Since then he has been wandering through the snows and brush on the mountain endeavoring to find his way back to civilization. Thirty men who have been searching for Mauer are encamped on the mountain today.

Mrs. Mauer, who is at Berryvale Inn at Sisson, where she has been prostrated with grief, was communicated over the phone last night and told of her husband's safe return.

X RAY AN ANTIDOTE FOR POISON

Seattle, Aug. 13.—Electricity has come to the aid of an antidote for laudanum poisoning. William McGregor, a Scotch seaman, was picked up unconscious in the streets Wednesday night. At the city hospital it was found that he was suffering from laudanum poisoning, but black coffee and drugs forced into his stomach failed to revive the patient.

Finally the X-ray was suggested, and 200 volts were shot into McGregor's body. In an instant McGregor came to his senses. With a cry that frightened the nurses, he jumped from his bed, jerked loose from the doctor and the nurses and ran like a madman through the ward and into the hall, where for a minute or two he danced a real Highland fling, yelling and cursing all the time. Two men sat on him to hold him until he became quiet.

FIRING BIG GUNS AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—Target practice with one of the big 12-inch guns at Fort Winfield Scott is being carried on today.

Before sunset there will be nine shots fired. When each projectile is hurled at the canvas target four and one-half miles at sea the shot will cost the government approximately \$300.

The projectiles weigh 270 pounds and with each shot 1,046 pounds of powder is burned. The target practice takes place but twice a year. Battery Safford is doing the firing.
