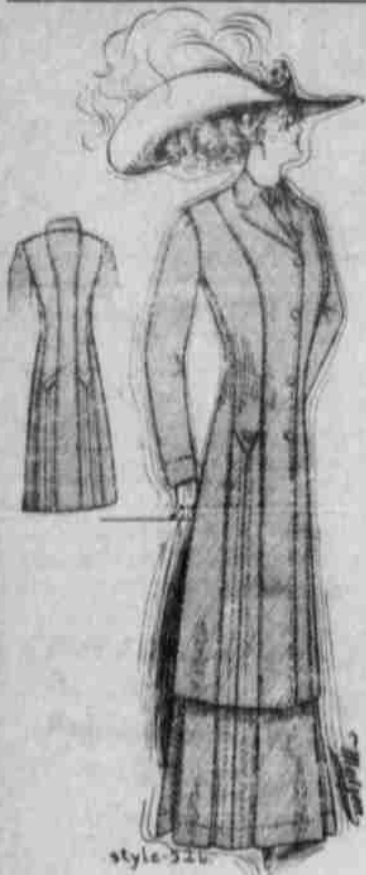

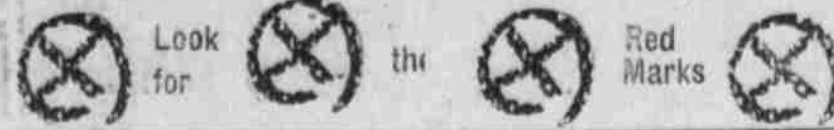

**Railroad Admits It—**
