JOURNAL MAN GOSSIPS ABOUT SUMMER RESORTS

Tells of the Old-timers Gone and the New Folks Come; of Salmon, Seal and Sardines; Moonlight Nights and Business; Fragrant Breezes, Livery Stables, Hotels, Surf and the Varied Things That Make Newport Oregon's Most Delightful Summer Resort.

Newport, Aug. 13.—(Editorial Correspondence.)—"Well, well, here we are again," as the clown in old Dan Rice's circus used to say. We have been coming to Newport for 20 years, have seen one generation pass away, and children grow to be men and women.

It would be interesting to see a list of the people at Newport 20 years ago and now.

Among those who have gone to other states here and hereafter are J. W. Ball, Thos. Briggs, Tom Russell, Martin Bayley, Dr. Bayley, Billy Neal, Berry, John Loomis, John Hunsucker, John P. George, Alex. McDonald, G. P. Mitchell, Capt. John E. Matthews, Brewer Schweibold, Sam Case, Mr. Lollis, Geo. Megginson, Mr. Jeffreys, John Fitzpatrick, Wm. Hammond, Allen Parker, S. R. Babbidge and Captain J. J. Winart.

Among the well known Newporters still alive are Mayor Bensell, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Abbey, Loomis Brothers, Landford Irvin, John A. Olssen, Dr. Carter, Mathews Bros., Ed. Seidler, John Fogarty, Chas. Winart, Morris Wyant, Capt. Jacobsen, C. H. Lee and Eugene Williams, T. J. Buford, Geo. Ford, L. E. Davis, Cal Bain and many more whom I cannot now enumerate.

The railroad is no nearer to Newport than it was 20 years ago. The expectation that Harriman would build down the bay side has not borne fruit. The distance from Toledo straight to Newport, by tunnelling a hill would be only eight or nine miles, while by Yaquina it would be 15 miles. But the road down the bay would be far cheaper and prettier.

The season has been cold, late and backward all over western Oregon and summer resort business has been light. It is now in full swing and bids fair to last until late in September.

FINEST SEASON COMING.

The last half of August and all of September are the choicest part of the year. The winds go down, gentle showers lay the dust, the salmon begin to run, the waters swarm with millions of tom cod, mackerel, capelin and sardines; and seal show their pretty round bullet heads in the surf and throng the bay. The days are warm and the nights fragrant with land breezes and the waters luminous with moonlight, starlight and phosphorescent effects.

AFTER FORTY YEARS.

Abel Uglow of Dallas came over this week, his first visit to the seaside since 1869. He then came on horseback to Pioneer, the head of navigable tidewater on the Yaquina, thence by river steamer Pioneer to Newport. He said there were less than a dozen houses where the city now stands. A print of Newport made 25 years ago shows surf bathing inside the north jetty, when Nye creek was undiscovered. South Beach was a busy place, and Seal Rocks was booming.

BUSY PLACES TODAY.

The Palace market and grocery is a great hangout near the postoffice, where everything from fish to fruit and camp groceries generally are kept. Mr. Prewitt had the misfortune to lose all the fingers of his right hand in an Enterprise spiral sausage machine. He only saved his arm by pulling out and losing his fingers. Mr. Prewitt was a knight of the grip for the Union Meat Company, and like a true hero of the gripsack, he bears his hard luck bravely.

J. S. Buxton, who has the old Lee Williams stand, corner of Fall street, has also a fine store. His former partner, L. C. Smith, runs a fine store at Nye Creek. Mr. Buxton made money at Forest Grove in the furniture and undertaking business but got tired of handling dead ones.

In spite of a number of large stocks Loomis Brothers are still doing a big trade in general merchandise, running a store at the Nye beaches also.

LIVE HOTEL PEOPLE.

Mr. and Mrs. Abbey do a large business at the old Bayview house, now the Abbey. Mrs. Abbey is very well and enjoys the distinction of being one of the best known hotel women on the Pacific coast. Mrs. Case and daughters con-

duct the Ocean house, Mrs. Fitzpatrick and daughters the Monterey. Same Irvin has the big hotel business at Nye Creek. He is a natural born hotel man and looks after the comfort of the ladies and children. Mrs. Bradshaw keeps up her furnished rooming house on the hill-top to a high standard, while Mr. Bradshaw conducts a first-class photo gallery in the city proper.

In the way of rooming houses Mrs. Shollenburg conducts the Grand. It is to be enlarged to three stories. They have been here eight years and last year burned out with no insurance. But they are fixed up better than ever and are hard people to keep down. Mrs. O. E. Carter has the Bayview rooming house, with a fine lot of rooms a block from the landing.

Stoker and Son have a big meat, fish and game market. They have been in business four years.

Real estate dealers are Lee Williams, and F. M. Hopkins, and Baker and Jones (B. F. Jones of Independence); the latter are reported to have sold the Megginson ranch at the government light house.

NEWPORTERS FOR THE PARK.

There are two live local newspapers, the News and the Signal. Both expressed regret that Salem people did not vote to acquire Fairmount Park. I told them many Salem people felt sorry, too. Mrs. Frank Brown of Salem said she was sorry the people voted the way they did. I told her I was sorry she did not have a chance to vote on the matter. Women almost universally wanted the city to have that place for a park. Salem of no end of good advertising when it was proposed to buy Fairmount, and has had many a knock at failure to carry the election. The city will have no such luxury as even a wild brush park until a few professional "tax-payers" are dead.

PACIFIC FLEET TO VISIT JAPAN

Washington, Aug. 14.—The itinerary for the winter cruise of the Pacific fleet has practically been decided today and it is announced that standardization tests will be made at Seattle from August 18 to August 28.

The fleet will arrive at Honolulu on September 11 and then sail under full power tests for Nares harbor, Admiralty Islands, and will arrive at Manila on November 1 for battle practice.

During December the fleet will visit Yokohama, Koeb, Woosung and Hong Kong. In January the ships will assemble at Yokohama and on January 15 will leave that port for San Francisco.
