

BUCKNER HAS THE SEVENTH

Owens a \$10 Gold Piece of the
Mintage of 1847 of Which
Only Six Are Said
to Exist.

The following story in our morning contemporary is good as far as it goes, but as usual the returns are not all in until The Journal is heard from, and then you get the latest. The story sent the Statesman from Independence is as follows:

"Friday, the thirteenth, is not an unlucky day for A. A. Bentley, a clerk in a local cigar store.

"The Oregonian of Portland, in the issue of this morning, contained an item of interest to all coin collectors. It reported the discovery of a \$10 gold piece of 1847. The money was paid as a fine in a San Francisco police court. As the Oregonian says, there were only six of these coins put into circulation before coinage of them was stopped. Four of them were accounted for on the Atlantic coast. Two of them were known to be on the Pacific coast but their owners had not been ascertained. The incident in San Francisco brings to light the fifth coin, and now the sixth has come to the surface in this city.

"A. A. Bentley, a clerk in a local cigar store, is possessor of this coin. He has known for some time that the coin was of value, but how valuable he was unable to tell. "Before closing time one evening a man came into the store and asked for change for a \$10 gold piece. The

change was counted out and Bentley noticed the date and immediately knew that the coin must be worth more than its face value.

"He switched the coin and has been carrying it for a pocket piece. Not long ago he noticed an item in the Portland Telegram telling of the similar coins, giving their description and mentioning that they were very valuable. Bentley wrote to a reliable firm of coin collectors and was offered \$300 for the piece. He decided to keep the coin and refused the offer.

"Today, on Friday, the thirteenth, he discovered that he was the lucky owner of the sixth and last of this series of \$10 gold pieces."

This morning Mr. W. F. Buckner, proprietor of the South Commercial feed mills, who had read the above story, snatched into The Journal office and smilingly remarked that he had in his possession the "seventh" of those "six" ten dollar gold pieces which made up the entire coinage of that series. He not only said so, but produced the \$10, which, sure enough, bore the date 1847. Of course, to the Journal reporter the date didn't look as strange as the gold piece, which is somewhat of a rarity to item chasers and pencil shavers generally. Mr. Buckner is proud of the fact that he has the only coin of the kind in existence. You see, the other six, the entire issue, is accounted for, and he has an extra one. It was taken in the course of trade at his place about a year ago, and if, as is claimed, the piece is worth \$300, Mr. Buckner is luckier than the fellows who drew prizes in the land lotteries, for with all the millions of chances he drew the seventh out of a possible six.

Coeur d'Alene, Ida., Aug. 14.—An investigation is under way today to determine whether Isador Selig of Myrtle Creek, Or., who drew No. 1 in the Coeur d'Alene Indian reservation drawing, is entitled to qualify for the land.

Judge James Witten, who conducted the drawing, said today that he had information that Selig already owns more than 600 acres of land and that if this is shown to be correct Selig cannot qualify. The first choice drawn by Selig is estimated to be worth about \$25,000, as it will give him an opportunity to choose land worth that amount, if he qualifies.

SITUATION SERIOUS IN SWEDEN

Five Hundred Corpses Unburied
and 5000 Troops Under
Arrest for Refusing
to Shoot.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Minneapolis, Aug. 14.—A cablegram received here today from Sweden dated Friday and sent via Denmark and Holland declared the strike is not broken as reported and published.

The cablegram states that the revolt is general throughout Sweden and that 500 dead persons are unburied because the strikers will allow no one to dig graves to receive the corpses.

From the same source it is reported that 500 troops are under arrest for refusing to shoot strikers when ordered to do so by their superior officers.
