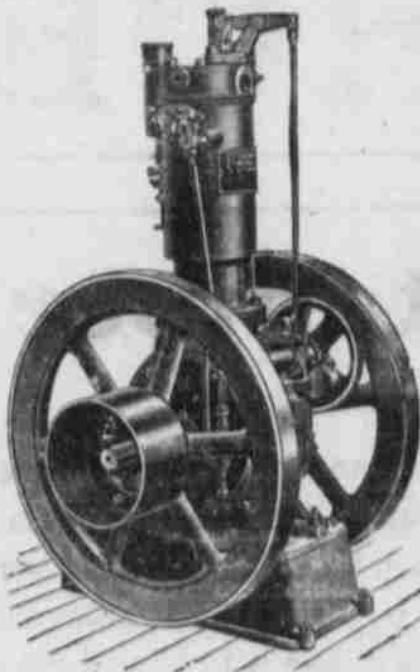

They were married yesterday at Mount Carmel, Ills.

WOMEN'S NOVEL PLAN FOR FIGHTING SCABS

Elwood, Ind., Aug. 14.—By treating a vocal din about the homes of the workmen loyal to the sheet and tin plate manufacturers in this city, wives and daughters of the striking employees are waging an effective campaign for the strikers.

The women gather in the vicinity of the workmen's homes shortly after dusk and by shouting and hallooing create so great a disturbance that sleep is almost impossible. The companies whose workmen are the objects of this unique method of campaigning have prepared a large number of affidavits containing their grievances against the strikers' women's auxiliary. They aver that husbands and brothers staid in the background, and urge the women to greater demonstrations.

CHINESE SORE AT THE AUTOISTS

Santa Barbara, Cal. Aug. 14.—Local members of the Hop Sing Tong aroused by the failure of a coroner's jury to hold F. H. Robinson guilty for the death of Leon Luen, whom he ran down in an automobile, have appealed to the powerful six companies of San Francisco to take action in the matter.

Leon Luen, who formerly was a cook in the employ of Admiral McCalla, was killed by Robinson's machine. The Chinese stepped off a street car directly into the path of the automobile, and the jury freed the chauffeur of blame.

Yesterday a petition to the six companies was circulated among local Chinese and forwarded to San Francisco. A similar petition asking the San Francisco organization to aid in prosecuting Robinson was drawn in Los Angeles and several hundred signatures secured. The Chinese have engaged counsel.

NEW YORK THE HOME OF BLACKMAIL

New York, Aug. 14.—"If I had been dishonest I could easily have made a million dollars annually," declared General Theodore Bingham, former commissioner of police of New York City in an article in "Hampton's Broadway Magazine," out today.

He charges that one hundred million dollars in graft and blackmail changes hands annually in New York City and alleges that Tammany is responsible for it. He asserts that:

"A crooked, supine and incompetent judiciary is what is the matter with New York."

Bingham declares that he was once offered \$5000 cash and \$5000 per month just to be seen shaking hands with the proprietor of a downtown cafe who wanted to use the acquaintance to convince people that he had police protection.

POWDER MILLS EXPLODE

Gary, Ind., Aug. 14.—Two workmen are dead as a result of a terrific dynamite explosion in the works of the Aetna Powder company at Aetna, Ind. One building owned by the Aetna company was destroyed and others badly damaged. Dozens of windows in the town were shattered.

The accident occurred late yesterday. Joseph M. Kohda, 37 years of age, a mixer, who was in charge of the building, and Michael McCarthy, his helper, were killed. Kohda was blown literally to pieces. A search for his body resulted in the discovery of a few shreds of flesh and cloth and two metal buttons.

Two hundred employees who were at work in other buildings were thrown into a panic by the explosion. They could not be induced to return to work for more than an hour.

The cause of the accident is not known.

HISTORIC BUILDING BURNED LAST NIGHT

Maysville, Ky., Aug. 14.—The historic court house at Washington, Mason county, on the steps of which the original of Harriet Ward Beecher's "Uncle Tom" was sold from an auctioneer's block, today is a mass of smoldering ruins. It was struck by lightning during a severe storm last night and burned to the ground.

The court house was built in 1794 and was one of the landmarks of the state. The first stone was laid by Louis Craig, a pioneer Baptist itinerant preacher, Daniel Webster, Henry Clay and other figures prominent in national history, often spoke in its court room.
