CHINESE WOMAN KILLED

Murder Shows Conditions of Slavery of Women Existing Among Oriental Races.

[United Press Leased Wire.] New York, Aug. 16.—Accused of murdering his beautiful slave "Bow Kum," Chin Len, an Americanized Chinese from San Francisco, is imprisoned here today. He strenuously denies that he killed the Chinese woman, and accuses Long Dong, another Chinese from the western city, of the gruesome murder at 17 Mott street yesterday.

The police do not believe that Chin is telling the truth and he is under strong suspicion of having committed the deed.

Near the doorway leading to the room where the woman was stabbed to death is the bloody imprint of a man's hand. The finger marks coincide with Chin's.

Chin declares that Long killed the woman because she refused to return valuable jewels he gave her when he first imported her from China for the slave traffic. These, according to Chin, Bow Kum took with her when she escaped from San Francisco with Chin to New York.

Until her tragic death the life of Bow, whose name means "Purse of gold," was intense and tragic.

She was kidnapped from her home near Canton and held a captive in San Francisco Chinatown for several years before she was rescued from the opium dens by Miss Donaldina Cameron, superintendent of the Presbyterian Rescue Mission. There for six months the pretty slave girl remained sheltered until Chin Len

arrived and in spite of Miss Cameron's protests claimed "The purse of gold" as his wife.

In February he left for New York with the girl and Long Dong, her previous owner, followed. He sought out Chin Len and demanded \$3000 as the price of "Bow Kum."

According to the Oriental now accused he refused to pay the price and Long Dong is alleged to have threatened serious harm to Chin Len, Bow Kum, or both.

Yesterday morning, the assassin, armed with a dagger, crept into the room where the woman lay sleeping, and stabbed her to death. The sharp steel pierced her heart. When discovered the girl was found on the floor by the side of a richly draped couch, and lying near by was the bloody dagger which had been used to take her life.

On the wall near the door was imprinted a man's hand in blood. The hand print and the dagger are the only clues the police have with which to run down the assassin and solve the mystery of the Asiatic colony which promises to prove as baffling as the identity of the murderer of Elsie Sigel, the white girl who was killed in the Chinese quarter recently.
