Portland, Aug. 17.—Several sales girls of the Golden Eagle department store in this city are recovering today from a joint fainting bee and hysterical handicap indulged in by them yesterday afternoon when Miss Beulah McClure, a package wrapper, swallowed a pin.

The pin was resting snugly on the pretty lips of the girl when a witty remark caused Miss McClure to open her mouth and laugh heartily. The pin disappeared and when Miss McClure realized that it had lodged in her interior department she fainted.

Miss Elsie Leece, sales girl No. 2, came to the rescue and Miss McClure was revived. With consciousness came a realization of the pin and a series of shrieks followed. This so startled Miss Leece that she went into hysterics and wound up by fainting.

By this time No. 3, No. 4 and No. 5 had crowded to the rescue, but the alternate hysterics and fainting of the first victims was too much for them and by the time several floorwalkers, cashiers and others of the firm had arrived excited women were shrieking and fainting alternately while the store was rapidly becoming clear of patrons.

With the aid of several attendants and the firm's automobile the girls were taken to their homes.

Shortly after the excitement had abated a floorwalker found a suspicious looking pin on the counter presided over by Miss McClure and the suspect is being held until it can prove an alibi.

**BURGLAR KILLED IN
ROBBING POSTOFFICE**

Lawrenceville, Ill., Aug. 17.—A bold attempt to rob the postoffice and bank at Sumner was frustrated early today when one of several yeggmen was killed by the police.

The residents of the town were awakened by a terrific explosion and soon almost the entire populace was on the streets. An investigation showed that an attempt had been made to blow open the postoffice safe. A posse of citizens headed by the police surprised the yeggmen at work. In a pistol battle that followed a yeggman was instantly killed.

**FINDING
LONG LOST
TAX MONEY**

San Francisco, Aug. 17.—A secret investigation of banks in San Francisco has been going on for several months following the discovery of a deposit of \$5,053.55 in one of the banks credited to the city tax collector.

It is expected that the mysterious deposit will throw some light on the defalcations of former City Tax Collector Smith, who recently was paroled from Folsom prison, where he had been confined after his conviction in 1905. It is estimated that Smith's shortage totaled \$184,000 and officials believe that some of the money which Smith was accused of taking might be found in other banks credited to the tax collector of San Francisco.

The \$5,000 deposit was found by J. J. Hassel, chief cashier of the tax collector's office. He communicated with Mayor Taylor, who advised that nothing be said of the discovery.

Soon afterward the money was withdrawn in favor of the mayor and placed in a safe deposit box and later was turned into the city funds.

Since then Hassel has examined the books of nearly every bank in the city in an effort to unearth additional funds that may have been deposited.

Hassel declares he received his information regarding the deposits from confidential sources, which he refuses to divulge.

**THREE
LEGS ARE
BROKEN**

As he was alighting from a street car Smith lost his hold and was thrown to the pavement so violently that his lower limbs were fractured and the car wheels, passing over the wooden leg, completed the breaking of all the legs in Smith's possession.

Smith denied today that he was endeavoring to lose a leg.

**PARTIES LOOKING
FOR THEIR BODIES****Searchers Expect to Find the
Bodies of Missing Men
in Some Deep
Crevasse.**

Tacoma, Aug. 17.—Although positive that T. Y. Gallagher of Seattle and Joseph W. Stevens of Trenton, N. J., who were lost in a blizzard while attempting to climb Mount Tacoma Saturday, have perished, a searching party of seven men, equipped with ropes, which will be used to lower them into the deepest chasms on the mountain, started out from Longmire Springs this morning to make a determined effort to locate the bodies of the missing men.

Relatives of Stevens have telegraphed that they will pay a reward of \$500 for the recovery of his body and this has encouraged the searchers to continue the hunt even though they admit that the odds are against them, as the bodies are no doubt lying at the bottom of one of the many deep crevasses which line the snow-covered mountain.

The lost men carried provisions enough to last only one day, and as eighty hours have now elapsed since they were caught in the blinding snowstorm, they have no doubt perished from hunger and exhaustion even if they escaped the fate of plunging over a precipice. The searchers who left today intend to first explore the crevasses in the White and Cowlitz glaciers. A signal code has been arranged so that those who are on watch in the various camps will be immediately informed of the finding of the men or their bodies. The explorers who started out today are all experienced mountain climbers. They are Joe Stampfer, Fred C. Smith, Sam Estes, Frank Kandle, Ben, Lem and Lyle Longmire.
