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THE TELEGRAPHING TYPEWRITER HERE

The machine, being a recent invention, is called the Burlingame telegraphing typewriter and is calculated to take the place of the telegraph operator. Instead of using the Morse code or requiring a skilled operator, the receiving typewriter at one end is operated by the typewriter at the other, producing a duplicate of the matter written on the first machine. SAYS THE SUBJECT IS THREADBARE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, Aug. 17.—The acuteness of the Pinchot-Ballinger controversy may fear itself here today the more strikingly by the dead silence at the interior department and the suppressed but all pervading atmosphere of enthusiasm at the forestry service bureau.

Assistant Secretary Pierce, who is back again and is acting secretary of the interior department, does not care to discuss the charges of maladministration made against Secretary Ballinger by Chief Forester Pinchot. Acting Commissioner Swartz of the general land office has the same aversion.

An effort was made today by a representative of the United Press to review the entire records at the land office including the mooted filing on 158.68 acres of land at Bozeman, Mont., by President Ramsey of the Riverside Land and Livestock Co.

It was this filing that Pinchot originally declares was in the interest of the power trust. This statement was specifically denied by Acting Commissioner Swartz several days ago.

The attempt to have this record examined by a land lawyer was disapproved by the department of the interior officials.

"The whole subject," said an official, "is threadbare. It is our policy to let the matter drop notwithstanding the counter charges which have emanated from the forestry service."

NO BIDS FOR JOHNSON IN SALT LAKE CITY
