

BLODGETT HAS NEW MERCANTILE FIRM OF PLUMPETT & THOMPSON

A mercantile business is being opened up at Blodgett by the new firm of Plunkett & Thompson. They have put in a new stock—a line of general merchandise—and will buy produce and ship it. Edgar Plunkett is a native of Kings valley; his father, James Plunkett, was one of the regulars of Co. D, Fourth regiment, sent from California to Fort Hoskins in the '60s—the company that rounded up the Indians on the coast and took them to the Siletz. J. A. Thompson was for the past nine years with the life saving crew on Coos bay, where he helped take the crew off the Nearcon last March, and also several other ship wrecks. He came in 1889 from Kansas and has been on the coast ever since. The firm is located permanently and has a fine country to draw trade from. They will be found accommodating young business men and will try "to grow up with the country" and expand as fast as it needs new lines of goods. They bought out J. A. Wood, who was the pioneer mer-

chant of the place, and has become a stockholder for the C. & G. railroad supply house at Albany. Mr. Plunkett is acting station agent and the store also has a fine dance hall, and both telephone lines.

HOMER IS SUED FOR DIVORCE

New York, Aug. 18.—Mrs. Daisy B. Davenport, wife of Homer Davenport, the cartoonist, is suing for separation. She charges abandonment.

Davenport is reported to have taken his blooded Arabian horses from the family home at Morris Plains, N. Y., to his new country home at Goshen, N. Y. This occurred in May, when it is said Davenport, aided by his servants, made a daylight raid upon the livestock at Morris Plains belonging to the artist and removed them to Goshen in spite of Mrs. Davenport's protests.

Friends declare that the differences existing between the couple are due to "artistic temperament."

Mrs. Davenport is represented by Attorney George Judd, who admitted that the suit had been filed, but refused to state whether Mrs. Davenport intends to sue later for absolute divorce.

SOME FINE LEGAL POINTS ARISING

Judge Galloway in department No. 1 of the circuit court arrived this afternoon and opened court for the week. Only one case was decided upon by Judge Galloway, that being the petition in the case of L. Q. Bower against Elizabeth Bower. This is a petition to the court to compel L. Q. Bower to pay \$2176 as the sum unpaid for the support of two minor children now living with his former wife, who is now divorced from her husband. The divorce occurred ten years ago, and in the petition it is alleged that Elizabeth Bower, the petitioner, supported the children at her own expense since the time ten years ago when the children were awarded to her custody by the courts and that she spent \$2176 in caring for the children. In connection with the amount asked for as back expenses the petition also asks for the payment of \$20 per month for the support of the children until they attain their majority.

Attorney George Bingham for L. Q. Bower filed a motion to strike out that part of the petition asking for the payment of the \$2176, but Judge Galloway overruled the motion Sept. 1 in which to make further answer.

In the case Judge Galloway holds that it would seem to follow that while the divorce alone dissolves the matrimonial relation between the parties in civil life, it does not in any way affect the parental relation existing between them and their children. When the divorce was granted some ten years ago they ceased to be husband and wife to each other, but their parental obligations to their children born to them in wedlock did not cease to exist and all of the father's duties and legal obligations rest upon him.

TAFT NOT "A HEAVY WEIGHT"

President Is Indignant Because of a Story That He Is in Speedy Class as a Boxer.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 18.—President Taft is angry enough today with Masseur Barker, his anti-fat specialist, to put on the gloves with him and deliver a "sleep tablet" or "haymaker" or whatever they call it in Frisco, because Taft suspects Barker is responsible for stories of presidential boxing.

Secretary Carpenter is desperate today under an avalanche of questions regarding the reports that the president has shown wonderful heavyweight prospects and that he has the making of a great boxer and wrestler.

"The president is not taking boxing lessons and probably never will," declared Carpenter today. "All the truth in the story lies in the fact that President Taft takes regular exercises with weights, dumb-bells, etc."

Barker also was loud in his denial that Taft is about to discard golf for a more Rooseveltian form of exercise.

"I never said the president was boxing," declared Barker. "I never said he had the making of a good prize fighter and wrestler and that all he needed was a little more training. The stories are a shame. No wonder the president is sore."

The presidential dignity of the present administration, which followed the regime when boxing and wrestling matches were in high favor at the white house is injured and there is trouble in the air about the summer capitol today.
