Fined for Speeding—

Two automobile drivers were haled into the police court this morning, charged with exceeding the speed limit. In answer to the charge, one of the autoists told Judge Moore that he had loaned his car to an outside party with the understanding the person he loaned the machine to knew all about running a car, but after meeting another auto man he was informed that his machine was in danger of being demolished, as he loaned it to a man who was not familiar with the operating of heavy automobiles. The two buzz wagon men then boarded another machine and struck out after the borrowed one, and while overhauling it they admitted they exceeded the speed limit, but did not do so for pleasure or through carelessness. No remonstrances were made when Judge Moore placed the fine at \$10 each. The numbers of the machines were taken on South Commercial street last night by a city councilman. Several complaints have been made by residents of South Salem regarding the automobile drivers making that thoroughfare a common speedway and it is probable that more arrests will be made in the near future if the speeding is not stopped.
