A Divorce Suit

Elia Thomas is attempting to secure a divorce today before Judge Galloway, through her attorney, Walter Keiser, from J. W. Thomas, on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment, and the defendant is contesting the proceedings vigorously with the assistance of Walter Winslow as counsel. In connection with sundry other acts of cruel treatment alleged and testified to during the hearing today, Mrs. Thomas claims that she was compelled to pitch hay while her husband stood by and held the ox team to keep it from running away. The defendant, when called to the stand, admitted that he held the ox team and let his wife load the hay, but it was necessary for him to care for the ox team owing to the flies being so troublesome and one of the beasts being ill-tempered and scary. Several other acts of cruelty was alleged and the case extended long into the afternoon before the counsel for the plaintiff and defendant argued the matter. The case will probably be taken under advisement by Judge Galloway.

ABANDONED WARDEN FOR CONVICT

Mrs. Emma Tompkins, Who Has Been Missing for Some Time, Found Living With Ex-Con.

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—After being lost from the sight of friends for a month, Mrs. Emma Tompkins, wife of a former warden of San Quentin penitentiary and formerly a well known society woman of Oakland, was found living in the same suite of rooms with W. F. Gordon, an ex-convict, for whom the police had been searching.

Today Gordon is in the city prison on a charge of passing a fictitious check. Mrs. Tompkins disappeared from her home at Fruitvale a month ago and all tract of her was lost. Late yesterday Detectives Burke and Balletto knocked on the door of a flat on Mission street and asked for Gordon. Mrs. Tompkins answered the door and refused them admittance.

The detectives pushed past her and found Gordon in the kitchen. Mrs. Tompkins followed the arrested man to the city prison, where she waited until her husband arrived from Oakland.

She stated to the police that she had nothing to say in regard to the case, but wept bitterly.

Mrs. Tompkins first made the acquaintance of Gordon while he was serving a six-year term for embezzlement at San Quentin. There he was permitted to act as tutor for Tompkins' son, Harold, who is now 19 years old.

After his release from the penitentiary in 1905 Gordon went to New York. Soon afterward Mrs. Tompkins, accompanied by her son, traveled eastward also. She placed the youth in school and took up the study of art in New York.

She admitted to detectives yesterday that she met Gordon while in the east.

Mrs. Tompkins is 45 years old and Gordon is 35.

Gordon is accused of passing an alleged bogus draft for \$25 on a tailor, which was repudiated by the bank on which it was drawn. The man is a graduate of an eastern university. His real name, according to the police, is Winegard.

THE FLOOD SITUATION IS WORSE

Arkansas River Raging Torrent From Steady Downpour Followed by Second Cloudburst.

Denver, Aug. 19.—Following a second cloudburst at Canyon City during the night, flood conditions along the Arkansas river are even worse today than they were yesterday.

Immense damage was caused by the downpour and the river is overflowing its banks at several points.

Hundreds of residents along the river front have been compelled to flee from their homes and seek places of safety.

BROWN BREAD, BEANS AND SPECTACLES

Boston, Aug. 19.—Boston has "fallen." After four days of mimic war the maneuvers ended this afternoon when the "Reds" won a decisive victory from the "Blues" at Hanover, opening a straight road into Boston.

The discovery of the plan of the "Reds" to feint the "Blues" right flank and then suddenly turn to the left, looking to the capture of Boston in the sham army maneuvers gave the "Blues," who are protecting the city, a much better chance against the proposed invasion.

After an hour of hard fighting early today, General Pew commanding the "Blues," repulsed the "Reds" at Bryantville. After the fight both forces hurried to Hanover, where a decisive battle will be fought this afternoon.

Although the "Red" land forces have a good fighting chance for victory, "Red" sea forces met with disaster this morning. Five of its torpedo boats were "sunk" and two of its battleships were "disabled" by the guns at Point Allerton.

The deciding battle was fought midway between Brantville and Hanover. The invaders numbered 9000 men, while the defenders had 2000 less.

For four days the "Blues" had defended the city against the attacks of the "Reds," and the news that Boston had "fallen" was received with great surprise, as it was believed that General Pew could easily hold out the rest of the week.

General Bliss outmaneuvered General Pew. Although the "Blues" had learned of the "Reds" plan to right flank them and then suddenly fall on the left flank, General Bliss effectually carried out this move.
