Los Angeles, Aug. 20.—Oriental drug dispensers and herb doctors are under the ban of the National Pharmaceutical association, which is holding its annual convention in this city.

Albert Schneider of San Francisco is the leader of the campaign that may be launched against the Japanese and Chinese practitioners who have during recent years flocked to the Pacific coast.

At the late session of the association yesterday Schneider criticized the freedom with which Chinese physicians were permitted to bring adulterated drugs and medicines into this country. He stated Japanese practitioners were worse offenders in this particular than the Celestials and asked that the session consider means of relief from existing conditions.

THE DADDY OF THE GREAT NORTHERN

New York, Aug. 20.—Lord Strathcona, who is now 89 years old, accompanied by his grandchildren, Donald and Miss Frances Howard, arrived on the Mauretania today en route to Vancouver, B. C.

Lord Strathcona was one of the promoters and backers of the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba railroad, now known as the Great Northern, when it was started in 1877.

BUCKET SHOPS CLOSED

St. Louis, Aug. 20.—Four hundred and sixteen "bucket shops," extending from Jersey City to Denver, are without quotations today following the discovery of the headquarters of the concern which furnished the telegraphic market information operating over a harness shop here this morning.

Immediately following the discovery of the place the authorities stopped all the instruments and closed the rooms occupied by the officials of the concern. The evidence gathered by detectives will be submitted to the September grand jury.

The finding of the headquarters of the operators was accidental. Detectives were searching for some men suspected of running "hand books" on the horse races, who none of them heard the click of telegraph instruments above a harness shop they were passing.

Reinforced by policemen they made their way into the room and found 10 telegraph operators at work and a force of clerks at work writing quotations on blackboards which covered the walls.

The sleuths then began to trace down the source of the information given to the officers of the raided concern and found another office rented by the same people overlooking the Chamber of Commerce. Further investigation brought to light the fact that a man with a spy glass read the quotations from the board of the Chamber of Commerce and then telephoned the stock quotations to the headquarters and from there they were sent to bucket shops in different cities.

The Missouri law against the operation of bucket shops is strict.

FRIENDSHIP WAS PURELY PLATONIC

San Francisco, Aug. 20.—Mrs. John Tompkins, wife of a former varden at San Quentin, who was found Wednesday lying in apartments on Mission street with W. P. Gordon, an ex-convict, has disappeared and all trace of her is lost.

All day yesterday search was made for her without success. She did not return to her Mission street apartments nor was she seen in Oakland or Fruitvale, where her home is.

Gordon states that his friendship for Mrs. Tompkins was entirely platonic in character.

"I was in Seattle," he said, "when I heard of Mrs. Tompkins' trouble. She asked me to come to San Francisco. This was two weeks after her separation from Tompkins. I rented apartments with two separate bedrooms. Mrs. Tompkins was in such mental and physical distress that I feared a breakdown and I wanted to be near. I was the only one she had to depend upon. I intended to relieve her distress by guarding her from danger."

TOOK A DRINK OF SULPHURIC ACID

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 20.—Dewitt C. Cooley, a farmer, is in a dying condition here today following a fatal mistake last night when he swallowed pure sulphuric acid which he thought was water.

Cooley was passing a creamery and saw a jug apparently filled with water. He took several swallows of the fiery acid and fell to the ground screaming in agony. The sufferer was given a large draught of cream which caused him to vomit forth much of the acid, but it is believed he cannot recover.

GOES SIXTY MILES IN AN HOUR

Curtiss Aeroplane Makes Record Flight—Also Makes Wright Brothers Jealous.

New York, Aug. 20.—Although C. F. Willard himself expressed some doubt of the authenticity of the records, the timers of three trial flights at Hempstead Plains today by the aviator in a Curtiss aeroplane reported that he traveled at all times at a rate not less than sixty miles an hour, the fastest time ever made in a heavier than air machine.

The flights were made in an aeroplane which the Wright brothers claim infringes their patents and for the destruction of which they entered suit yesterday.

Over one thousand persons witnessed the flights and cheered the aviator.

The first flight started shortly before 5 o'clock. Willard flew to the Meadow Brook club, over Camp Black, and then toward Hempstead and Garden City and back to the starting point, a distance of three miles. The timers recorded the flight in two minutes and 56 seconds.

The second flight covered the same course with wider sweeps and was accomplished in three minutes flat, according to the timers.

The third flight was terminated abruptly by a split in the canvas rudder. The accident was not serious and the machine was quickly undergoing repairs.

RINGLING ACROBAT DIED THIS MORNING

Seattle, Aug. 20.—Louis Falcon, known to the sawdust ring as "Pacheco," is dead at the city hospital of acute pulmonary oedema. Until Monday night Pacheco was a tumbler and acrobat with Ringling Bros. circus, now here. He became ill at Vancouver, B. C., on Monday and lapsed into unconsciousness, from which he never emerged.

Over-exertion in his acrobatic work is believed to have resulted in the affection of the lungs that caused the man's death. Falcon was only 22 years of age.

GENERAL MARINA WHIPPED

Unconfirmed Dispatches State That 600 Spanish Troops Have Been Killed and Many Mutinied

Lisbon, Aug. 20.—Six hundred Spaniards have been killed, according to dispatches received today, in the campaign started Wednesday by General Marina against the Riff tribesmen.

The messages, which are unconfirmed, are from Melilla and stated that several of General Marina's battalions have mutinied, either joining the Moors or fleeing toward French possessions in Morocco.

After being decisively defeated in his latest campaign General Marina was compelled to retire to Melilla to await reinforcements.

J. PIERP. MORGAN TO BUY RAILROAD

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 20.—J. Pierpont Morgan today paid to the secretary of state his personal check for \$96,047 for articles of incorporation for the Chicago and Great Northern railway, which he will buy tomorrow at the receiver's sale.

The company will be reorganized with a capital stock of \$96,000,000. The incorporators and the board of directors will be composed of members of the Morgan law firm in Chicago and dummies, the road being entirely under the control of the firm.
