AVERILL HARRIMAN IN DANGER

With Party of Surveyors in the Coeur d'Alene Country and Surrounded by Forest Fires.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Spokane, Aug. 20.—The fear that young Averill Harriman, 18-year-old son of E. H. Harriman, the railroad magnate, may be caught with a party of surveyors by a great timber fire in the Coeur d'Alene Indian reservation is prevalent here this afternoon. Young Harriman is with a party sent out by the Oregon Railroad and Navigation company and officials of that road here are anxiously awaiting word of young Harriman's safety.

As soon as the whereabouts of the party can be definitely established a relief party will be dispatched from Coeur d'Alene. In the meantime search is being made for Harriman and others of the surveying parties who are in the danger zone.

Began at the Bottom.
Chicago, Aug. 20.—Averill Harriman is only 18 years old, but when his father went abroad for his health he was given the choice of how he was to spend the summer. Instead of taking a vacation abroad he decided that he wanted to know something about how railroads were built and as his first start in the direction of a railroad magnate was given a position carrying the chain in a surveying gang on the Oregon Short Line in Idaho.

Despite the millions of his father young Harriman declared that he wanted to start at the very bottom of the ladder, as any other boy would have to do.

Then Averill persuaded his chum, George Dixon, son of George A. Dixon of New York, one of Harriman's family physicians, to join him in the "chain gang." They were started in positions paying \$65 a month, and placed on the payroll of the Oregon Short Line.

THESE DO NOT AGREE WITH MR. MATHEWS

San Francisco, Aug. 20.—The theory advanced by President Mathews of the University of Chicago that the intermarriage of white persons with Japanese and Indians probably will produce a superior strain of blood in the whites is being met with much opposition by California sociologists and anthropologists who take the opposite stand on the subject.

Miss Jessica Peixotto, assistant of sociology in the University of California, said today:

"I am not inclined to agree with Dr. Mathews, and I would like very much to look at some of the evidence on which he based his lecture on 'race prejudice.'"

Dr. G. F. Boyard, president of the University of Southern California, said:

"I must emphatically say that I do not agree with Dr. Mathews. I see no grounds upon which to agree with him. I believe the differences between the two races is too great to be bridged over."

Rev. Chas. Locke, pastor of the First Methodist church in Los Angeles, declared it to be his belief that Dr. Mathews did not know any more about the question than the majority and that the majority could not foresee any grounds on which to substantiate such a theory.

"I am not and never have been a believer in miscegenation, and I don't believe any good could come from the union of the two races. The white and yellow peoples must remain apart," said he.

POWER SITES ARE WITHDRAWN TODAY

Washington, Aug. 20.—The interior department announced today that pursuant with the policy of the present administration and at the direction of Secretary Ballinger, acting Secretary Pierce has withdrawn temporarily power sites including 2959 acres along the White River in Utah. It will be reported to congress that these withdrawals have been made in order that proper legislation may be enacted to provide proper power sites and to prevent monopolies. It was stated.
