M. D. WISDOM DIED AT PORTLAND THURSDAY

The sad news was received in this city yesterday afternoon from Portland of the death of M. D. Wisdom, one of the most widely known men in the northwest.

He came to Oregon with his parents when he was but one year old and settled at Baker City, where he resided for the greater part of his life, and in 1888 he moved to Portland. In 1895 Mr. Wisdom and J. W. Bailey purchased the "Rural Spirit," one of the leading farm papers of Oregon today. Mr. Bailey having retired a few years after the purchase, Mr. Wisdom conducted the business alone.

On December 22, 1899, he was appointed secretary of the state board of agriculture, and since then he has done a splendid work in developing the state fair.

During the Lewis and Clark exposition Mr. Wisdom was selected superintendent of the livestock exposition and the exhibit he organized was recognized as the greatest ever brought together in the history of expositions. He also served as superintendent of the Seattle fair.

Mr. Wisdom was twice married. He married Miss Cordella Moore in Baker City on March 21, 1876. She died in 1882, and July 24, 1888, he was married to Miss Winnie Brown of this city, who survives him. Three children were the issue of the first marriage, John M. Wisdom of Oakland, Cal., and Layton M. Wisdom of Portland, the third child dying in infancy. By the second marriage there are two children, Stanton Wisdom, aged 14, and Preston Wisdom, aged 12. He is also survived by his brothers J. W. Wisdom, Baker City; J. O. Wisdom, Greenhorn, Or.; W. M. Wisdom, Cal-

ifornia; George W. Wisdom, Portland and J. T. Wisdom, Baker City.

The funeral will take place at Portland Sunday at 2 p. m. from St. David's church, under the auspices of the Elks club. The remains will be cremated.

EXPECTS AUTOS TO RUN 125 MILES AN HOUR

(United Press Licensed Wire.) Indianapolis, Aug. 20.—"Within the next year I predict that the drivers of the machines in automobile races will be making 125 miles an hour."

This was the statement made today by Carl Fisher, president of the new Indianapolis motor speedway, where yesterday Wm. Bourque, driver of the Knox car in the 250-mile race, and Harry Holcomb, his machinist, were dashed to death when their car crashed into a fence.

Although two records were broken yesterday when Barney Oldfield covered a mile in 43 1-10 seconds and Louis Chevrolet shattered the ten-mile record, making the distance in 8:56 4-10, Fisher declares that the marks yesterday were far from being satisfactory to him.

STREET CAR MEN MAY YET STRIKE IN CHICAGO

(United Press Licensed Wire.) Chicago, Aug. 20.—The motormen and conductors of the Chicago Railway company today rejected the new wage scale offered by the company and a strike seems almost a certainty.

GIRAFFE 20 FEET TALL.

Animated Skyscraper Has Mate That Matches It in Size.

Of all the animals of the earth, the giraffe is perhaps the oddest. No mention of it is made in the scriptures, but scientists tell us that it lived many years before the flood. Its long neck, they say, was occasioned by centuries of reaching in an effort to pluck the highest leaves of its favorite tree.

The giraffe can utter no sound, having no vocal organs. It can go quite as long without water as a camel, preferring at times to go for days without drinking, getting its moisture from the damp moss on the trunks of the jungle trees. Giraffes are found in the forest belt that hugs the equator in Africa, though hunters have driven them so far into the impassable jungle that only occasionally is one found. There is great danger of killing them in trying to capture them, and of those that are shipped the majority die on the sea voyage. So it may be seen why the animal is absent from the city zoos and but very rarely seen.

The two tallest giraffes in captivity will be seen in Salem with the Ringling Brothers' circus on Thursday, August 26, and it probably will be the last opportunity of seeing one of the species, as they are fast disappearing from the face of the earth. The taller of these two giraffes measures twenty feet from his hoofs to the point of his nose. He is a beautifully marked animal and in the pink of condition. His companion is equally attractive, though not quite as tall.

The star attraction of the big menagerie is Darwin, the missing link, a strange animal so nearly like a human that he puzzles scientists. He is probably closely related to the chimpanzee class, though none other of the kind bears such a striking resemblance to the human. He lives in a house with all the appointments of the ordinary home, but, of course, on a somewhat smaller scale. He has electric lights and a miniature hot water heater. He drinks from a bottle and uses knife and fork while eating.

The rest of the menagerie is quite as interesting as the home of Darwin. There are 40 elephants and 108 cages and dens with the rarest animals from jungle, forest and mountain.

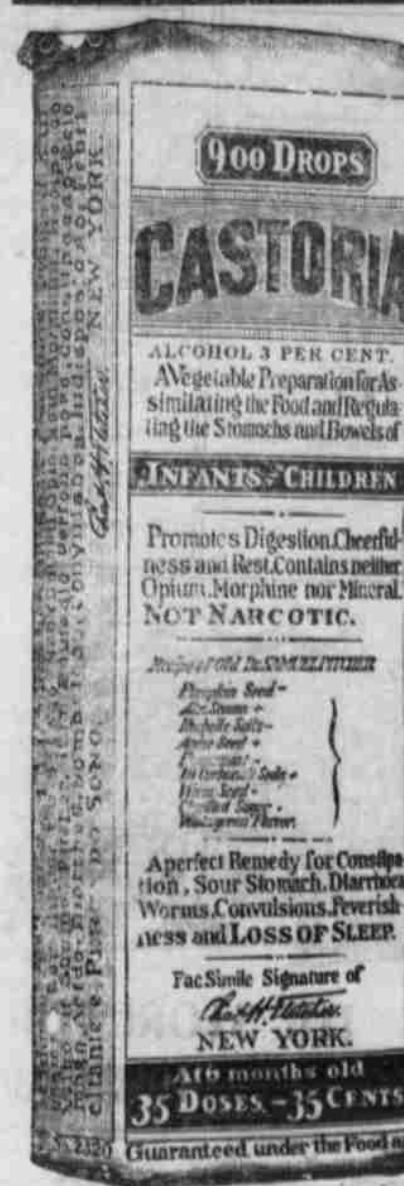

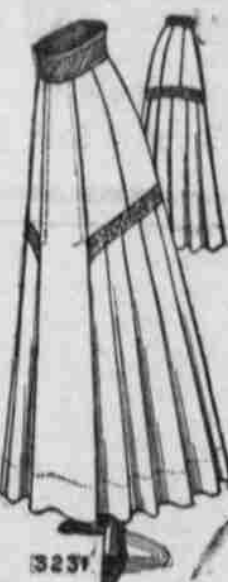
