ARRANGE PROGRAM FOR TAFT

Portland Solves the Problem by Turning Him Over to Committee of Five Leading Citizens.

The question "What shall we do with our ex-presidents" has caused considerable discussion at times, and has never been satisfactorily answered. Just now there is a much more important question up to the mayors, city officials, limelight hunters, would-be "sassy" leaders and the near-beer brand generally. It is "What shall we do with Taft?"

Seattle has had an upheaval over it, and now Portland, the generally quiet little burg down at the mouth of the creek, is wrestling with the problem.

Mayor Simon appointed a committee to arrange a program for entertaining the president, consisting of T. B. Wilcox, Dr. J. R. Wetherbee, F. W. Mulkey, J. C. Alsworth and B. S. Josselyn, who evolved and submitted to the president's private secretary about this: The committee will meet the president at the depot, and will escort him along with the military to hotel, where the committee will breakfast with him. Then he will take a motor ride with the committee. Returning to the hotel he can have luncheon with or without the committee as preferred (probably the latter by this time) and then a public address at the armory, and a banquet in the evening with the committee and 295 others. This suited the committee much better than the balance of the 200,000 people in Portland, but they haven't any say in the matter. The committee also suggested that the president could pay the bill himself, if he so desired, which was thoughtful of them; though in justice to them it is right to say they offered to stand for the feed. This comprises the program for Saturday.

For Sunday the committee decided to let Taft be his own boss. He will

be permitted to lie in bed, go to church, visit the ball game or go fishing if he can get bait and dig up a \$5 piece for license.

The First Baptist and First Congregational churches have already invited him to attend their services, and Dr. Elliot of the First Unitarian church, to which denomination, by the way, the president belongs, has told Mayor Simon that "he wishes the president to know he will be welcome there." The other churches have not been heard from, and the president, who has some wisdom, will probably not say which church he will attend, which will give him a chance to escape the committee.

Taft is big enough to go round if any one is, but naturally cannot be divided up amongst the people. All this worries the little folks who have the weighty problem of how not to please the president on their minds.

Taft is a great, big-bodied, big-hearted, every-day American, and a chance to see the people and the people to see him is all that is required. That would suit the president and it would suit the people, all of whom want to see him, and who wouldn't give two whoops in glory to see the committee, the members of which seem to forget that they are only the parsley around the steak, a bit of tender green around the true juicy meat, which is only used to add to the appearance of the steak.

ITALIANS SWEATING GOLD

and tried before the federal court. The prisoners are Paulo and Vitteri Demartini and Carlo Perosio.

Until a few weeks ago the trio lived in La Grange, Stanislaus county, and were looked upon as innocent farmers. Last week Paulo Demartini visited one of the local banks and deposited \$300 in twenty-dollar gold pieces. The coins appeared considerably worn, but the Italian stated that he had been carrying them in a belt for a long time. That evening when the bank teller made up his cash he found that it failed to tally. He had stacked the coins and counted them in piles. Thinking that he had made a mistake, he recounted them piece by piece and found that his accounts tallied. It was then that he discovered that the money had been shrunk. The bank officials called the attention of Sheriff Sibley to the matter and Moffitt was sent for.

Later Paulo Demartini withdrew his money and with the other members of the trio applied at another bank for exchange on Italy to the extent of \$1,000, but the banks were all on their guard and the thinness of coins was detected and exchange was refused. Then the men purchased tickets to Italy from G. B. Gianelli, local representative of a steamship company, and exchanged a considerable amount of their money for Italian coins. Moffitt has secured several pieces of "sweated" money from Gianelli and has had the trio arrested.

The men are known to have had \$1300 worth of "sweated" twenties. How much more they may have disposed of here is a matter of conjecture. Detective Moffitt says the coins appear to have been sweated by means of an emery cloth. They took from 1/2 cents to \$1 from each twenty-dollar piece by the process.

A marriage certificate was issued today by County Clerk Allen to R. Solum, aged 21, and Gesta Marie Island, age 31, both of Silverton.

His Horse Died

Mr. Frohmader, who lives on the corner of Front and Columbia, had a serious loss yesterday when one of his horses, valued at \$200, died after two days' sickness.

Only a Grass Fire

The fire department was called out yesterday afternoon by a blaze near a warehouse on North Winter street. The department found the blaze was only a grass fire and soon put the building out of danger.

Porters Came First

Two applications were received by the secretary of state this morning for automobile licenses. The applicants were Twoby Bros. and the Porter Bros., the railroad men whose names have appeared in the newspapers frequently of late. Twoby Bros' license was numbered 2228, while Porter Bros' were given No. 2227.

May Reach Speed Limit

Workmen are busy today doctoring up the state house elevator preparatory to connecting the water pipe with the larger pipe from the penitentiary waterworks. When the connection is made, which will be some time next week, the old elevator which formerly patterned after the salmon run, up in the spring and down in the fall, will go up and down like Harriman stocks on a fake death report.

Lowering the Track

The Southern Pacific has a big gang of men at work lowering the track on Trade street where it crosses Winter street. The Portland Railway, Light and Power Company has already put its street car tracks down to grade there. As soon as this work is completed the gang will begin work near the freight depot preparatory to the building of the new one.

Stage Carpenter Pete Phillips is doing the house cleaning work at the Grand opera house today. Pete, with the assistance of a few hands and some clean river water, has put the amusement sections of the opera house in excellent shape upstairs and down.
