RANCHER SENT HILL TO THE HAY STACK

(United Press Licensed Wire) Great Falls, Mont., Aug. 21.—A hard-hearted settler last night refused Louis W. Hill, son of James J. Hill and president of the Great Northern railroad, a bed in his home and the young railroad king was forced to spend the night in a haystack. Hill was making the trip from Helena to Great Falls in his automobile, when the machine stuck in the mud near Fort Shaw. After trudging several miles for help, Hill came upon the home of a settler in the dense woods. When Hill asked the settler for assistance in freeing the machine from the mud the man replied that he was too busy to leave the house. Hill argued and pleaded with the man until it was too late to look for assistance from other sources. Then he asked for a bed for the night. "The only bed you will get at my place," said the farmer, "is the hay stack. You will find that only about half a mile down the road." When Hill told the farmer that he was president of the Great Northern railroad the farmer was skeptical and refused to believe him. As there was nothing else for Hill to do, he spent the night in the hay stack, where searching parties, worried by his long absence, found the railroad magnate today peacefully sleeping in the hay.

PRESIDENT GERLINGER OF THE FALLS CITY, DALLAS & WESTERN R. R. ANNOUNCES THAT TRAINS WILL OPERATE FROM WEST SALEM BEFORE FAIR TIME-- SEPTEMBER 13
