## RULING IS A BENEFIT TO 'FRISCO

Will Cause all the Products of Philippine Islands to Be Shipped to That City.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, Aug. 21.—According to Collector of the Port Frederick Stratton, San Francisco will be greatly benefited by the ruling of the treasury department which decided that only shipments from the Philippines coming direct can be admitted to the United States duty free. As San Francisco is the only direct port of entry, necessarily the shipments will be billed to this port and then transhipped, according to shipping men. Stratton said:  
"There are only two direct lines from Manila to the United States, the Pacific Mail and the Toyo Kisen. None can, under the circumstances, run direct to New York, where the bulk of the product of the Philippine Islands is expected to be landed. The decision denying free entry to products transhipped from the islands to the United States will serve to build up the commerce of San Francisco."  
Virtually all the products of the Philippines, rice excepted, is allowed to enter the United States free. Annually 300,000 tons of sugar, 300,000 pounds of wrapper tobacco, 1,000,000 pounds of filler tobacco and 150,000,000 cigars are shipped from Philippine ports. In addition there are a number of shipments of copra, hemp, fruits and imports of minor value.

## HIS WIFE MURDERED IN STORE

Denver, Aug. 2.—Strangled to death with a handkerchief, Mrs. D. Goldman, wife of a jeweler of this city, was found murdered in her husband's store early today.  
The shop had been looted and it is believed that the robbers killed the woman in cold blood and then ransacked the shop, while her body lay on the floor.  
One suspect has been arrested and scores of detectives and policemen throughout the state are on the lookout for the criminals responsible for the double crime.  
Goldman went to a lodge meeting last night and left his wife in charge of the store. He told her to close the place early and return to their home.  
The jeweler remained late at the lodge, and returning home after midnight missed his wife. After searching about the place for her, he went to the store and discovered her dead body.  
The thieves evidently had taken their time in looting the store, as it was apparent that they had gone over the stock carefully.

## THE SEA LION WAS NOT BROKE TO LEAD

Seal Rocks, Or., Aug. 21.—The sea serpent today has been retired in favor of an enormous sea lion, which according to J. Holgate, attempted to drag him, his horse and buggy into the waters of Alsea bay. Summer residents here are listening to this thrilling tale by Holgate:  
"The animal must have weighed a ton," said Holgate. "I saw him sleeping on the beach and I tied a rope around his neck and started to haul him away. The old fellow refused to budge. Then he became frightened, turned and made for the water. The rope around his neck held all right and my horse and buggy followed the sea lion. If I hadn't jumped out and cut the rope, I guess it would have been 'curtains' for us."
