## ONE WIDOW AND JOB LOT OF CAPTAINS

One Captain a Suicide, One in Hospital and One in Jail. Widow and Ducats Still Free.

Seattle, Aug. 23.—Captain Charles Anderson is in a hospital here today with a bullet in his chest and Captain John P. Peterson, his rival for the affections of Mrs. C. B. Smith, widow of the late Captain C. B. Smith, for many years notorious on the Pacific coast, is in jail. The two captains fought a spectacular duel in the attractive widow's home on Twentieth avenue yesterday. Captain Anderson's wound is not believed to be dangerous.

The two met in Widow Smith's mansion by chance, each cast glaring eyes at the other as the afternoon's social intercourse progressed. Mrs. Smith, somewhat ill at ease under such circumstances, tried as best she could to keep her rival admirers on terms of peace, but finally the wrath of Anderson burst forth and he is said to have roundly berated her for encouraging Peterson in his attentions, whereupon the latter drew his revolver and shot Anderson, he claims, for his abuse of and insults to Mrs. Smith.

Captain Peterson was lodged in jail pending the result of Captain Anderson's wound. "Shanghai" Smith, the late husband of Widow Smith, committed suicide in the Brunswick hotel because his wife had instituted pro-

ceedings for divorce from him. His will, recently probated, gave the widow his entire estate, consisting of the Twentieth avenue home and other property of a total value of about \$100,000.

### DECLINED THE FLAG PRESENTED BY TAFT

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 23.—The Kee Too Wah society, which is composed of full-blooded Cherokee Indians, has administered a rebuke to President Taft that probably rankles today in a deep recess of the presidential brain.

Congressman Charles Creager, who has returned from Washington, brought with him the handsome American flag that floated over the white house the day that Taft assumed directorship of the destinies of the nation. The flag was entrusted to Creager to be presented in behalf of President Taft to the Indian society.

Late yesterday the executive committee of the redmen's organization met and drafted a set of resolutions, a copy of which was sent to Creager. The Indians announced that they are desirous of inculcating the principles of Christianity among their young men; that their organization is in no sense a political one, and therefore, if the flag is a trophy of the recent Republican victory at the national polls it must be refused with thanks.

### PAGE AND PICKENS CHAMPION DRILLERS

Globe, Ariz., Aug. 23.—Luke Page and James Pickens, Globe miners, today stand ready to meet any team in the world for the drilling championship and a substantial side bet.

Page and Pickens yesterday sustained their championship claims by defeating a pair of drillers from Cobalt, Ont. In 15 minutes the local men drilled through 4 3/4 inches of solid granite, defeating the visitors by 13 inches. This performance is believed to be a record for the south-
