Gets Judgment for Part—

The finding of facts in the case of O. Jetti against J. E. Smith et al were concluded today by Judge Burnett and the plaintiff was given judgment in the sum of \$289.75. This case has been pending for some time, being brought by Jetti to recover \$730.34, which he alleged was due him for lumber purchased by the plaintiff from the defendant, who was a store keeper, amounting to \$440.59, which he subtracted from the total amount sued for.

Judge Webster fined them \$20, and owing to their financial holdings being strained at present they were locked up in the county jail.

EIGHT ARE KILLED

to disperse. The men now, however, were filled with the lust for blood and slighting the constabulary they opened fire on them. Trooper Williams fell dead from his horse. Then it was that the constabulary were ordered to shoot to kill. Before this order was given the strikers poured another volley into the state police and Trooper Smith fell from his horse mortally wounded.

When an ambulance made its way to the car plant for the purpose of carrying the wounded troopers to the hospital the vehicle was attacked and the driver forced to flee for his life.

As soon as the news of trouble reached Pittsburgh Sheriff Gumbert swore in a hundred additional deputies and these were hurried to McKees Rocks on a special car.

Ten rapid fire machine guns were quickly dispatched to McKees Rocks in automobiles.

The strikers after two months' idleness today are desperate. Their families are suffering for the want of food. Although a commissary department has been organized provisions are coming in slowly and the pangs of hunger is beginning to show its effect by driving the men to disorder.

The wives of the strikers are becoming conspicuous in the rioting. Some of them even carry pistols, but the majority of them are armed with clubs and stones, which they are using effectively.

On account of their sex the police heretofore have paid little attention to them, but since last night's rioting they have been ordered to use their maces unsparingly.

More trouble is feared tonight and additional deputy sheriffs will be sworn in today and sent to the scene to assist in keeping order.

The streets of McKees Rocks and Schoonville, the scene of last night's violent rioting, are practically deserted this afternoon, except for the state constabulary and deputy sheriffs. No one is being allowed to enter the town unless they can satisfactorily explain their mission.

No one is allowed to loiter about

the streets and even reporters are kept moving. Sheriff Gumbert, fearing more rioting again tonight, will ask Governor Stuart this afternoon to rush a detachment of the state militia here.

President Hoffstott this afternoon said that the reports of last night's rioting had been greatly exaggerated. While it has been officially reported that eight men are dead he declared that the number of injured would not exceed 20.

The continuation of the fight between his company and its employees, he said, is largely due to the interference of outsiders, aided by socialists and the sensational statements made by certain newspapers.

Will End Rioting.

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 23.—Governor Stuart and Captain John Groome commander of the state constabulary, are conferring here today regarding the Pittsburgh strike situation. Late this afternoon it was decided to await developments and if the result of the next 24 hours warrant it additional troops will be rushed to McKees Rocks.

Governor Stuart is thoroughly aroused over the continual violence there and is determined to put a stop to the rioting even if he has to call out the entire state militia to do it.

The Fruit Union—
