AMONG THE SEPTEMBER MAGAZINES

Crime in London and in New York.

It is impossible for any London newspaper to exploit crimes as is done in New York. It would be impossible for anyone to say how many burglaries were committed in London last week, how many pockets were picked, how many swindles, or whether crime is more prevalent now than it was this time last year. The leading daily newspapers including the Times, give the proceedings of the police courts a very prominent place, selecting the cases of general interest and reporting the proceedings without comment. The London police told me that there is just about the amount of crime in London that would be normal to a population so large and where there is so much wealth and such an army of strangers. From other sources I was told that a number of mysterious crimes, including murder, go undetected, though the number is far below that in New York.—From William McAdoo's "The London Police from a New York Point of View" in the September Century.

The September American Magazine.

"Hill against Harriman—The Story of the Ten Years' Struggle for the Railroad Supremacy of the West" is the leading feature of the September American Magazine. It's author, George H. Cushing, says "Hill has worked in the tomorrow of things, Harriman today. Hill has won by projecting an idea ahead of him and working up to it. Harriman thinks in present profit and crashes through opposition with the weight of his financial support. Hill's is the success of brain; Harriman's of money and organization." The article gives a surprising glimpse into the inside workings of great railroad deals.

High grade fiction is contributed by Inez Haynes Gillmore, Mrs. L. H. Harris, Fielding Ball and James Oppenheim, while interesting reading is offered in "A Sergeant on the Sergeant Problem," "Margarita's Soul," "The Pilgrim's Scrip," and "In the Interpreter's House."

The Price of Ignorance.

About the tenth of last July 209 cars of peaches reached New York market and more than a hundred fruit cars came in the next day. Two things happened. Perhaps 150 cars sold for barely enough to pay transportation charges, and tons of peaches were dumped into the bay by order of the New York board of health.

It was the harvest for the buyer and the speculator. He picked up the choicest fruit by the carload—in most instances for just enough to pay transportation charges from Georgia—reshipped them to his own market and sold them for a good price. In these smaller markets, remote from New York they were short of peaches, and eager to pay good prices for them. But this the distant grower did not know. Lack of organization, of intelligent cooperation on the part of the growers wrought their own destruction. Their orchard toll was more mispent than the strength of Samson who shook the temple pillars and brought the ruins down upon his own back! The advantage which the buyers in remote markets took of "the New York peach glut was a legitimate one."—Forrest Crissey, in the September Everybody's.

The aeronaut, blinded by the continuous glare and himself visible to all the defenders below, will have to fly to the edge of the shining battlefield, there to be sought out by single searchlights and followed by shells from the guns below."
