OBJECTS TO COLLEGE METHODS

Says They Have No Right to Take Our Young People, Christians, and Return Them Atheists

San Francisco, Aug. 24.—"I deny the right of our American universities and colleges to take our young men and women reared in Christian homes to faith and confidence in the tenets of our religion and send them back to us atheists. I tell you this is not right and the sooner this fact is remedied the better it will be for the American people."

The above statement was made by Rev. Frank L. Goodspeed, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Oakland. "They tell us," continued Dr. Goodspeed, "that some of our college professors are 'sowing the dragon's teeth of doubt.' Articles in our leading magazines show us that some of the men now enjoying positions made possible by Christian sacrifice and Christian beneficence are 'blasting the rock of ages.' If this be true, we indeed are in a sorry way."

"Our colleges are supposed to teach something constructive and positive in religion and if they cannot do this it certainly is their duty to keep quiet on the subject. It is incumbent on any man who takes from us anything valuable in the sum of our faith to replace it with something better. Criticism is very easy but creation is difficult. The ultimate stronghold of faith is 'not in the mutable judgments of the understanding, but in the native sentiments of conscience and the inexhaustible aspirations of affection.'"

TALKING THROUGH HIS HAT

Uncle Joe Cannon Says He Is Going to Make Greatest Speech Ever Made Anywhere.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—Aroused by the aspersions cast upon him by Congressman C. N. Fowler in his open letter yesterday, Speaker Joseph Cannon today said that he would "make far fly" when congress meets again. Cannon said:

"I intend to call a friend of mine to the chair and take the floor and speak as long as I am allowed. I tell you the fur is going to fly. Some people who profess to be republicans will get the severest castigation that you ever heard. I intend to call a spade a spade. Some of these people who are ranting about the present tariff bill supported and helped frame the Dingley bill. Their present rampage is hypocrisy. Some of the men who talk of legislation being stiffed will have their records shown up at my hands."

"Your old Uncle Joe is going to talk in language anyone can understand, and I promise that for virility it will rank as a master piece. It's time someone showed these malcontents just where they stand."

Mackinac Islands, Mich., Aug. 24.—"Why in h—l should I notice Fowler?" asked Cannon today, referring to Fowler's open letter of yesterday in which he attacked "Cannonism."

Cannon read every word of the letter and then said:

"Get a pencil and take this: 'I've glanced at Fowler's letter. To those who had the patience to read it, if there are any such, it will appear when in the exercise of the duties of speaker I failed to make him chairman of the committee of currency and banking that in his mind I became thoroughly selfish and generally a bad citizen.'"

Cannon then added that he is willing for his colleagues of the house of representatives to question his action in refusing to appoint Fowler.

When asked if he would speak specifically regarding Fowler's arraignment, Cannon said:

"Why in h—l should I answer him? He's a joke and all congress knows he's a joke. It would be beneath my dignity to notice any statement made by Fowler."

INCUBATOR BABY STILL IN LIMELIGHT

Kansas City, Aug. 24.—Mrs. Barclay, who, through Attorney Gentry, has petitioned a habeas corpus proceeding to recover 5-year-old Marian Bleakly, the "incubator baby," who it is alleged she kidnapped Saturday, today discussed the alleged kidnapping of the child.

"You wonder why I love the baby," she said. "If you had seen her clenching her tiny fists and gasping for breath in the incubator at the St. Louis exposition you would wonder why Marian is alive today. I say without boasting that it was my care and love saved the child her life."

"It is remarkable that she is not afraid of me today though. I do not know all that Mrs. Bleakley has said to poison her mind."

"When you picked her up the other night didn't Marian ask you if you were going to kill her?" Mrs. Barclay was asked.

"Yes," she replied.

"I wouldn't kill you," I said to Marion. The child asserted that 'they' had told her that she would be killed and finally I comforted her and she warmed up to me."

While Mrs. Barclay was talking the child sat beside her and the woman's hands strayed almost unconsciously to Marian's head, which she patted lovingly.

"I did not intend to kidnap the baby when I went to Topeka," continued Mrs. Barclay. "But I saw the child outside the kindergarten cry. I talked to her and learned that her mind was poisoned and then I decided to act."

The habeas corpus proceedings will be heard tomorrow.

Today the baby was happy and laughed and played that she was in jail.
