ed in the incorporation have the right to so change and reconstruct their city laws in any manner which will not be inconsistent or conflictive with the constitutional laws of the state; that the incorporation of the port will, it is true, deprive the included cities from absolute municipal ownership, but the advantages, use and the benefits derived from such an incorporation will not be taken from the other municipalities and the port is to be operated and conducted as other state institutions.

Another point in law which Justice King cites and which is considered foreign to former cases coming before the attention of the Supreme Court is regarding the effect of the legislative act providing for the incorporation of the port will have upon the charters and ordinances of the cities included. Justice King cites parts of the constitution of the United States and of state constitutions whereby it compels the strict compliance of each separate state, county and municipality to the act requiring the enacting of laws, either special or regular to be entirely consistent with the government constitution; and this rule must be enforced from the highest class of government to the lowest incorporated municipality. This conclusion of law thoroughly sustains the constitutionality of the act directing the cities included in the incorporation of the Port of Coos Bay to so construct their charters and city laws that they may not be conflicting with the general laws of the state.

Two other opinions were handed down as follows:

Amelia E. Morse et al., plaintiffs, vs. F. E. Whitcomb et al., respondents; petition for rehearing denied; opinion by Justice King.

State, respondent, vs. J. A. Moxley, appellant, appealed from the circuit court of Wallawa county. J. W. Knowles, judge, affirmed; opinion by Justice McBride.
