ONE BAD INDIAN MAKES A GOOD ONE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Hanford, Cal. Aug. 24.—Lee Phillips, an Indian, is in jail here today following an altercation last night after a drink of whiskey during which it is alleged he shot and killed Jim Alonza, another Indian.

After Alonza had been killed the man attempted to escape to the mountains. After a posse had pursued the Indian for three hours they surrounded him on a ranch a short distance from this city.

The man showed fight, but when the officers drew their guns and covered him he surrendered and made no trouble. He was immediately brought to Hanford and placed in jail.

Both men were employed as sheep shearers on a ranch a few miles southwest of Hanford, where the shooting occurred.

DISCOVER RELICS OF PRE-HISTORIC RACE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Port Townsend, Wash., Aug. 24.—Local scientists learned today that Dr. Waldemar Yochelson, a Russian explorer and savant, who with a party of ethnologists, is working in the Aleutian archipelago, has come upon the relics of a race which is believed to have inhabited the islands in prehistoric times. The party discovered skeletons and implements of warfare and household utensils which would indicate that a high state of civilization existed there thousands of years ago.

The party will continue its researches for several years and will send a complete report to the Russian Royal Geographical society which is financing the expedition.
