[United Press Lensed Wire.] New York, Aug. 26.—Alfred G. Vanderbilt this morning strenuously denied the report that he had been shot and killed last night at the Grand Union Hotel.

When seen today Vanderbilt was breakfasting at the Hotel Plaza.

**STRIKERS QUIET BUT DESPERATE**

Conditions at Schoenville Like Civil War—Sharp Shooters Shoot State Troopers.

[United Press Lensed Wire.] Pittsburg, Aug. 25.—The town of Schoenville, where the Pressed Steel Car company strike is in progress, has assumed a civil war appearance instead of a town riot-gripped. Sharpshooters are in the woods on the heights above the works. Troopers, heavily armed, parade all the streets.

A great searchlight, mounted on top of the plant, with the operator protected by a sheet of steel, is constantly revolving tonight to discover any effort to break inside the stockade and to spot sharpshooters. The state troopers have laid aside their maces and ride out of the stockade with rifles across the pommels of their saddles.

The entire community bears a grim aspect. Both sides are waiting for some move that will bring on conflict. Eugene Debs, the Socialist leader, today urged the men to fight to a finish, and they are determined that they will not leave the community or give in. Arms are being purchased at gun stores and there is fear that the near future will bring about a conflict that will startle the country.

During the early hours Wednesday morning several shots hit the metal shield erected by the deputies for protection against fusillades out of the dark. The marksmen were on a high hill about a quarter of a mile distant from the works. Only the poor ability of the marksmen prevented the loss of several lives today.

The state troopers will not permit any one to stop and talk. The foreigners must remain at a distance of

indoors, but they are stubborn and revengeful.

Further adding to the warlike appearance of the stockade, Lieutenant Charles P. Smith and 25 troopers today went to a large tenement house in Preston. The place was surrounded and squads were detailed to search the apartments of 20 families. Three rifles, 10 revolvers, 10 knives and a machete were confiscated.

**TOWN OF KRUPP IS BURNED**

Fire Started From Sparks of Great Northern Engine—Loss Is Estimated Today at \$400,000.

[United Press Lensed Wire.] Wilson Creek, Wash., Aug. 26.—Merchants of Krupp, seven miles east of here, are today erecting tents to be used as temporary places of business until permanent structures can be built to take the places of those burned in yesterday's conflagration, which destroyed the greater part of the town. The loss is today placed at \$400,000, partially covered by insurance.

Handicapped by not having fire fighting apparatus of any kind, the flames, which originated in an empty warehouse, spread rapidly to the business section, and almost every business house in the town was wiped out. An appeal was made to Wilson Creek, and a chemical engine and 40 men went to Krupp. The brigade was a welcome relief, as the people were worn out by their efforts to stay the progress of the fire.

Sparks from a Great Northern Freight engine set fire to the warehouse of the Farmers' Grain Supply Co., at 12 o'clock yesterday, and, with a stiff wind blowing from the south, laid waste the entire business portion of the town, causing loss of \$400,000. The fire quickly spread to adjoining warehouses and jumped the street to the general store of the Krupp Mercantile Company. The postoffice, furniture and harness shop are all that are left of the business houses.

Bucket brigades carried water from wells and from Crabtree creek, and several narrow escapes from serious injury and even death were averted, several persons fainting from heat and exhaustion. The fire apparatus and a number of citizens from Wilson Creek came up in a freight car and gave all the aid possible.

F. A. Wingate has already ordered another stock of goods, and will resume business as soon as possible. Others have stated they would resume business as soon as possible.
