LAUNCH AND FERRY BOAT COLLIDE

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 27.—An official investigation is in progress to determine the responsibility for the collision between a steam launch from the United States cruiser Colorado and the ferry West Seattle in Elliott bay last evening, which resulted in the damaging of both vessels and the injury to four persons, besides imperiling the lives of several others. But for the timely assistance of the launch Telegram, which happened to be in the vicinity, it is thought that two or three of the men thrown into the water would have been drowned.

All of the injured were cut and bruised, but their hurts are not thought to be serious.

An inspection of the cruiser Colorado had just been completed by a delegation of visitors, and the launch was bearing the party shoreward when the collision occurred. In the launch were also several members of the ship's crew who had shore leave. The approaching ferry was concealed from view by the stern of the Colorado, and the launch smashed into the "West Seattle."

Several of the passengers on the launch leaped overboard, and were picked up by the Telegram, just in time to save them from drowning.

Colonel Thomas McTeague, formerly warden of the Montana state penitentiary, rendered valuable assistance in saving the lives of several of those in the water.

ZEPPELINS BALLOON ALL RIGHT

Makes Great Flight and Averages More than 25 Miles an Hour—Lights for Ballast.

Stuttgart, Germany, Aug. 27.—Count Zeppelin's dirigible "Zeppelin III" passed over Stuttgart at 10 o'clock this morning enroute from Friederichshafen to Berlin, and had made 130 miles in five and one-half hours.

Engineer Durr dropped a message in which he said that he expected to arrive with the ship at Bitterfeld tonight. Bitterfeld is 220 miles from this city.

At Bitterfeld it is expected that Count Zeppelin will board the aerial vessel and make a triumphant entry into Berlin tomorrow.

Owing to illness the count preceded the airship to Bitterfeld as he did not feel as though he would be able to stand the journey in the dirigible.

At Berlin Kaiser Wilhelm and members of the royal family will welcome Zeppelin upon his arrival there.

The balloon was compelled to land at Ostheim to take on more ballast and repair the propeller, which broke. It took two hours to repair the propeller and secure the ballast, after which the voyage was resumed toward Berlin.

SCHIVELY CLEARED BY SENATE

Lacked two of Necessary Two-thirds on One Charge. On Perjury Charge Vote Was No.

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 27.—John H. Schively, insurance commissioner of Washington, stands unconvicted by the senate, sitting as an impeachment court, of high crimes and misdemeanors and malfeasance in office.

The lifetime that saved the insurance commissioner was the technicality. He was not insurance commissioner in fact, but a deputy, when the extortion of money from insurance companies was alleged to have been committed, and the only other charge dealing with his conduct since commissioner, that of perjury before the Spokane grand jury, failed signally when the evidence was produced.

The vote that came nearest to the impeachment of the insurance commissioner lacked two of the necessary two-thirds of the senate members, and was taken on article 24, which charged him with malfeasance in collecting salary as deputy commissioner when he was under pay as president of the Pacific Livestock Association and in recommending the company by letter as deputy insurance commissioner, when he knew it was insolvent.

On the perjury charge every member of the senate voted "not guilty," and so decisive is this action as to the failure of evidence to sustain the Spokane charge that it is predicted here that Schively will never be brought to trial before the Spokane courts on the grand jury indictment that is still outstanding against him.

PARDEE SOUNDS NOTE OF WARNING

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 27.—Former Governor Pardee, of California, who made an attack upon Secretary of the Interior Ballinger at the irrigation congress at Spokane, recently, spoke before the first National Conservation Congress here this afternoon, speaking in part as follows:

"Wealth is too often used in this country today to take from the people their political rights, and to turn their representatives into chattels and debts of those who desire to oppress the people by taking from them their natural resources.

"No man in this country who reads and thinks doubts that some governors, legislators, congressmen, senators and judges have prostituted the office to which by the votes of the people they were elected.

"There are those who desire to monopolize the water power of our rivers; are eager to grab the forests; desire to seize the coal lands and use them all for their private aggrandizement, to the detriment of the people.

"Is there any sound reason why the people should not regulate natural resources?

"Is there any reason why the government should turn back to public entry one single acre of forest lands which were withdrawn under Roosevelt and Garfield?

"To say that every man should be permitted to grab and hold what he can of natural resources, is equivalent to saying that one has no objections to arranging matters so that future American citizens shall be composed of a very few rich and millions of very poor people. Such a doctrine is neither decent nor patriotic."

Pardee urged waterway improvement, and quoted from Roosevelt's speech at the governors' conference in Washington last December, when Roosevelt said that conservation was the most vital problem confronting the nation.
