ROSEBURG HAS HEAVY FIRE LOSS

[United Press Leased Wire.]
Roseburg, Or., Aug. 25.—A loss of \$50,000, conservatively estimated, has fallen upon local merchants today because of a fire which destroyed several business places, two rooming houses, a large livery stable and barns last night.

The fire is believed to have started in the stables of the Roseburg & Coos Bay Stage Company, and spread to the adjoining structures. Seventeen horses belonging to the company were burned to death, and the stage line service was indefinitely interrupted.

The burned block is at Cass and Sheridan streets opposite the Southern Pacific railroad station.

GERMAN PAPER MAKERS DO A QUICK STUNT

The directors of a large paper factory at Eleuthal, Germany, in which American methods have been introduced, have set a remarkable record in connection with a newspaper. At 7:30 a. m. three trees were cut down in the forest which surrounds the factory, and, after having been deprived of their bark and branches as fast as a force of men could do it, they were carried to the pulp mill. They were instantly transformed into paper, and at 9:34 the first roll of paper was ready. The press room was two miles off, and the paper was rushed there in an automobile, with no loss of time, and was immediately fed into the press. At 10 o'clock, sharp, the first copies were sold, printed on paper which two hours and twenty-five minutes before had been waving in the morning breeze.

GETTING READY FOR THE FAIR

Many Improvements Are Made
That Will Prove Conven-
ient to Exhibitors
and Visitors.

In spite of the fact that there remains only 16 days in which exhibitors at the Oregon state fair have to arrange their booths and decorate the pavilion, there is only one booth being worked upon. The pavilion is in the same shape as it was when the last fair closed, the decorations overhead being still in good shape, and will be presentable enough, with a few minor repairs. Owing to the booths representing the different counties being put up permanently last year, it will be only necessary to tack on the decorations and install the exhibits. A general house-cleaning will be indulged in probably, when Secretary Welch returns from Seattle, which will be next Tuesday. There is the many old boxes and other rubbish to clear away from the main floor of the pavilion, and the assembly hall to be cleaned out. The floral department is also in need of considerable attention, but, as the fair employees have not allowed the earth in the department to dry out, it will be practically very little work to arrange things suitable before the 13th.

The carpenters working on the new waiting and resting room have got along in excellent shape during the past week. The floor has been laid, and work is being done on the roofing and siding of the structure. Salem plumbers are busy installing the toilets and wash basins, and it is thought the entire building will be ready for occupancy in another week. The sewage problem is about solved now. There remains but a short distance to complete the sewer, and the officers of the fair are hopeful of having a perfect sewage system installed by the opening of the fair. This work has occupied many hours of hard thinking on the part of those constructing it, as piping could not be obtained until up to the last minute.

As yet there is nothing being done toward coating the new administration and entrance building with cement.

This will also be a piece of work which can be completed in a short time, and the board expects to have the structure ready for fair time.

The new stock judging arena is now completed, and it makes a wonderful improvement to the fair's livestock show ground. A few of the live stock entries have arrived, and the first of the week they are expected to come in rapidly. The Southern Pacific company has a large gang of men working on the switch extension, and it is now extended from the station house to the stock barns. The line runs around the north side of the grounds just outside of the fence, and, when completed, will prove a much more convenient place for the stock exhibitors to unload their exhibits. The new walk from the recently built entrance to the Southern Pacific track is nearing completion. The street car company will begin operations within a short time removing its track from the north side of the, Alvin road to the south, and construct a roomy platform just opposite the S. P. Station for the benefit of the car riders.

The usual throng of race horse men is on hand, although not in so large a number as they were last year at this time. Both morning and afternoon the sleek racing machines can be seen speeding around the Lone Oak track in their regular daily try-outs. The big racers have not arrived from the south as yet, but they are expected now soon, that the circuit is closing up in the south. The racing men who are in the city at present are expecting great things of the horses which will be on the turf here during the fair, and there will undoubtedly be some more records smashed. The Lone Oak track is receiving a daily dressing, and is in fine shape.
