

CURRY COUNTY IS "WET"

Owing to non-compliance with the statutory provisions of the local option election law, Curry county, which has been "dry" since 1904, has been declared "wet" by the county judge. Some \$1500 in the shape of fines have been collected from the bootleggers, and it is probable that this money will have to be returned to them. It seems that the temperance people of Curry county filed a petition asking for a local option election in 1904, and the question was duly placed on the ballot, but no announcement was given officially, as required by law, that such an election was to be held in the county. After the voters had declared for prohibition the county court issued an order declaring the county dry, and it was so considered, and all official acts were in conformity since that time. In 1908 the question was again submitted to the voters, and due notice was published by the election officials that such an election was to take place.

Again the county voted dry, but the officials forgot to make the legal declaration, as required.

NORWAY'S DAY AT THE SEATTLE FAIR

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 30.—The "Viking," typical of the sturdy little ships that carried the hardy Norsemen of the middle ages on voyages of discovery that made their fame secure, sailed into the Seattle harbor today, under command of Captain Eric Thornd, ushering in Norway's day at the exposition.

As the Viking made her landing, Captain Thornd, who represented Lief Erickson, the sea knight, was greeted by his bride, Miss Astrid Udness, of Bellingham. Disembarking at the Lake Washington gate, the sea king and his Vikings paid tribute to the queen, and the ceremonies of turning over the ship then took place. At the conclusion, the sea king, his warriors, the queen and her attendants, headed by the St. Olaf college band, marched to the Stadium, where a grand, historical parade was formed. The parade, which was one of the features of the day, marched about the grounds and disbanded at the natural amphitheatre, where at 2 o'clock in the afternoon the exercises of the day were given and a bust of Grieg, the father of the Norwegian school of music, was unveiled.

BALLINGER IS ON HIS WAY EAST

(United Press Licensed Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Aug. 30.—Called to Washington on official business Secretary of the Interior Richard A. Ballinger is today on his way East, having left Seattle late last night over the Northern Pacific railroad. Before leaving the city Mr. Ballinger stated that he would return with President Taft's party on the Presidential trip to the West. He declared there was no particular significance to the call which takes him East at this time.

"I have been called to Washington," said Mr. Ballinger, "to take up important matters that have been accumulating for the last two months. During my absence many things have come up which require my personal attention. It is an emergency call from my department." In discussing the announcement from Beverly of the sudden resignation of Ormsby McHarg, assistant secretary of the department of com-

merce and labor, Secretary Ballinger said he did not think McHarg's statement denouncing the Roosevelt-Pinchot policy on conservation had any bearing on his resignation, and added:

"That statement of his was just like McHarg all over, and he was right about it. He is always loyal to his friends."
