County Court to Meet—The county court will meet tomorrow in regular session. There are a lot of bills and other matters to come before the court this month and it is probable that some further action will be taken on the proposed road to the Santiam mines.

Crossed Mountains to Marry—County Clerk Allen today issued a marriage certificate to a brother official from Grant county. The lucky officer is O. Mosler of Canyon City, treasurer of Grant county, and the bride-to-be is Julia H. Round of Jefferson.

Aurora Files Complaint—A. F. Will, a real estate agent and insurance man of Aurora, has filed a complaint in the offices of the railroad commission against the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, claiming that the railroad company fails to provide accommodating service from Aurora to Portland. He al-

leges that there is but one train a day out of Aurora for Portland and many trains pass daily but do not stop, causing great inconvenience not only to himself but to the citizens of Aurora in general.

Complaints of Baggage Smashers—Having disposed of one complaint against the managers of the union depot in Portland, which was filed by William U'Ren, the railroad commission is now confronted with another. The complainant in this case is A. P. Donohue of Portland, and his cause for grievance is the same as that of U'Ren, the unaccommodating baggage department at the union depot. Donohue alleges that he travels many hundred miles yearly and he is compelled to wait longer to check his baggage at the union depot than any other he has had cause to do business with. In his communication to the commission he claims that at one time he was forced to wait from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 2 o'clock in order to check his baggage, and upon informing one of the employes of his unnecessarily long wait, he was given an insolent answer.

In Justice Court—Alvan Fisher is being tried in the justice court this afternoon. Fisher is charged with larceny by bailer, by taking and converting to his own use a bicycle which he had rented from the Moore bicycle establishment. Attorney Brown is defending Fisher. The case against P. C. Merwin will be tried in the justice court tomorrow at 10 o'clock. Merwin is charged with selling liquor on Sunday and without a license.

FOUND REMINDERS OF AN OLD OFFENDER

A small room which is located in the very center of the county jail and which has never before been explored by any of the county officers, was entered yesterday afternoon by Janitor Matlock. The janitor went into the small apartment at the request of Sheriff Minto. He came out with an old rusty pair of leg shackles, a case knife, pocket knife

and a long piece of thin steel, all made into saws with which to work on iron. The leg bands were sawed in two close up to the locks.

The finding of these old relics refreshed the mind of P. F. Wrightman, who was sheriff of Marion county 11 years ago. Sheriff Wrightman had cause to arrest a plumber in the name of Frank Ferres in this city and locked him up in the county jail. When Ferres went into jail his conduct was hardly bearable by the authorities and he was repeatedly getting into difficulty, and the sheriff put leg irons on him. At the time Ferres said he would be "clear" by morning, and sure enough, when the sheriff visited the jail the next morning Ferres was standing up in the cell where he was locked, free from any chains or locks of any kind. It was simply impossible to keep shackles on Ferres and he was locked in his cell the greater part of the time.

The leg irons which Janitor Matlock found were those Ferres cut off his ankles when Sheriff Wrightman was in charge. The small vacant room in which the articles were thrown is located in the center of the ring of cells, it being constructed there originally for the purpose of ventilation, and through a small hole Ferres concealed his knives and leg irons, which was a mystery that could not be solved by any of the officers until Janitor Matlock unearthed them.

SALEMITES HOME FROM THE SILETZ
