### JAP WINDOW WASHER SLASHED WOMAN

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—Fukami Hinziro, a Japanese, is in jail here today, while Mrs. M. Barbee, of 259 Church street, is in a serious condition at her home from a number of knife wounds alleged to have been inflicted on her by the Japanese yesterday when, it is said, he became enraged over what he considered not enough to pay for washing windows, and attacked the woman with a knife.

According to Mrs. Barbee, her alleged assailant aimed at her throat, but she struggled and he only succeeded in slashing her arm in several places.

After the altercation the window washer ran down the street, where he was apprehended by Policeman McGuire. The Japanese showed fight, and the policeman was compelled to subdue him by a stiff right to the jaw.

### GENERAL CAVANAUGH DIES AT TACOMA

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 1.—General Thomas H. Cavanaugh, former surveyor-general of the state of Washington, is dead today at the home of his sister, Mrs. W. W. Hayes, in this city. A son, Major J. B. Cavanaugh, engineer corps, U. S. A., stationed at Washington, D. C., arrived a few hours after his father's death. Besides his son and his daughter, Mrs. Irene McIndoe, of Portland, he leaves a brother, William F. Cavanaugh, of Olympia, and three sisters.

General Cavanaugh was a high Mason and served one term as grand commander of the G. A. R. for the department of Washington and Alaska.

## SPENT HER MONEY ON ANOTHER

Wealthy Widow Puts up Money to Buy Mine and Promoter Uses It to Build a Theater.

[United Press (Leased Wire.)]

Marysville, Cal., Sept. 1.—A suit is filed today against R. Lee Van Wormer, a well-known local mine promoter, and two alleged associates by Mrs. Carrie Beam, a wealthy widow of Paterson, N. J., to recover \$36,000, which she alleges she loaned to Van Wormer to acquire a mine, and which she claims he spent in building a theater and buying automobiles.

She loaned the promoter the money, she says, with the understanding that he was to purchase a mine, the profits from which they were to share. According to her complaint, Van Wormer, who was an old friend, at first borrowed \$6000, and later got an additional \$30,000, on the plea that it was necessary to consummate a deal he had on. Finally her complaint stated she voiced a desire to view the mine, which he said he had purchased, and when Van Wormer showed but little enthusiasm she got suspicious and took a flying trip to Marysville from Paterson to examine her property.

The complaint recites that no mine had been bought, but instead he had spent thousands in procuring a lease on a lot and the erection of a theater building on it for the benefit of Miss May Arlington, who is named as co-defendant.

Another sum, so the complaint declared, has been used for the purchase of an expensive automobile, while additional sums are said to have gone to the support of J. J. Cusick, another mining promoter, who is likewise named as a defendant with Van Wormer.

To prevent the three defendants from ridding themselves of any property they may now possess, Mrs. Beam has caused an injunction to be issued against Van Wormer and his associates.

Mrs. Beam stated today that she has an abundance of evidence to prove her contentions, and, if possible, she will get back a portion of the money which she alleges Van Wormer was generous with.

### STOLE VAWTER'S AUTO WHILE HE WAS AT CIRCUS

The Medford Tribune says: W. I. Vawter has found no trace of his automobile, which disappeared from the circus grounds on Saturday afternoon, although a network has been spread in all directions to stop its getting away. Whether it succeeded in slipping through or not is not known. No trace of any kind has been found of it.

The car disappeared while Mr. Vawter and his family were attending the evening performance of the circus. The car was standing near the main entrance to the big show, but it was nowhere in sight when the show was over.

The car was a large "Olds 40." It was in splendid condition and is nearly new, having received splendid care since it was purchased last year by Mr. Vawter. It was registered in this state, its number being "472."

The police were at once notified and a network spread to apprehend the car and to arrest the driver. So far no clue of any kind has developed.

### ARTIST EARLE HAS ANOTHER SOUL MATE

New York, Sept. 1.—B. Russell Hertz, editor of "Moods," a "magazine of personality," and a close friend of Artist Ferdinand Pinney Earle, who, it is alleged, has left New York for an European tour with Miss Gertrude Dunn, a well known literary woman and settlement worker, declared today that he was in a position to know that Earle was "perfectly mated this time."

Earle is best known as "the original affinity," who started two continents when he deserted his first wife for Miss Julia Kuttner, whom he subsequently wedded, and who is now suing to annul the marriage.

"This affair between Earle and Miss Dunn is entirely spiritual," declared Hertz today, "and I know that they are just as perfectly mated as it is possible for human beings to be. It also is their intention to always remain soul mates, and there will be

no marriage unless the couple decide that they want children.

"At any event," he concluded, "there will be no wedding ceremony." Miss Dunn, according to Earle, is of a type directly opposite to his famous affinity, Julia Kuttner, now Mrs. Earle, and he declares that Miss Dunn is no more to him than a "mentality."

A brother of Miss Dunn today declared that his sister had not eloped with Earle. He said that he was convinced that the real relations between his sister and the artist were perfectly proper.

"My sister and Earle," declared Dunn today, "are simply friends. They are interested in the same project of starting an orphanage. Yesterday I received a letter saying that she was in Paris alone and would sail for New York on September 4."

Miss Dunn and Earle, it is reported, left New York on July 25, but so quiet was their departure that most of their friends knew nothing of it until late yesterday.

### IT IS OPEN SEASON FOR BANK CASHIERS

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 1.—Fifty armed men today are scouring the woods for two bandits who late yesterday held up Cashier F. H. Nipp, and looted the vaults of the German National Bank, at Minneola, Iowa, of \$1500 in gold.

There were two customers in the bank when the robbers entered. One of the bandits had his face covered with a white handkerchief, while the other wore no mask.

One of the men covered the two customers while the other, at the point of a revolver, forced Cashier Nipp to open the safe, after which it was looted by the bandits. After securing the \$1500, the robbers hurried away, and when last seen were walking east on the Wabash tracks. The police have a fairly good description of one of the men.

### THE CHLOROFORM GOT IN ITS WORK

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—"Good bye all; chloroform won't kill." Leaving this note on his desk in the Marine Engineers' club today, Martin Anderson, of 1436 Walnut street, Alameda, walked to the Mission street wharf with the evident intention of jumping in the bay, when the chloroform which he had drunk at the club overcame him and he collapsed on the pier. He died before he could be taken to the emergency hospital.

Anderson leaves a wife who resides at Los Angeles. He was 40 years old. No cause can be ascribed for the deed, as the man was in apparently good health and financial circumstances when he drank the fluid which ended his life.

### YAKIMA HOGS HAVE PLEURO PNEUMONIA

North Yakima, Wash., Sept. 1.—So rapidly has the epidemic of pleuro pneumonia among the hogs of the valley spread that the city health department today established a quarantine against all the swine of the county. The health officers are unable to say how the disease began, or spread so rapidly. It is estimated that over 300 hogs have died in the county in ten days.

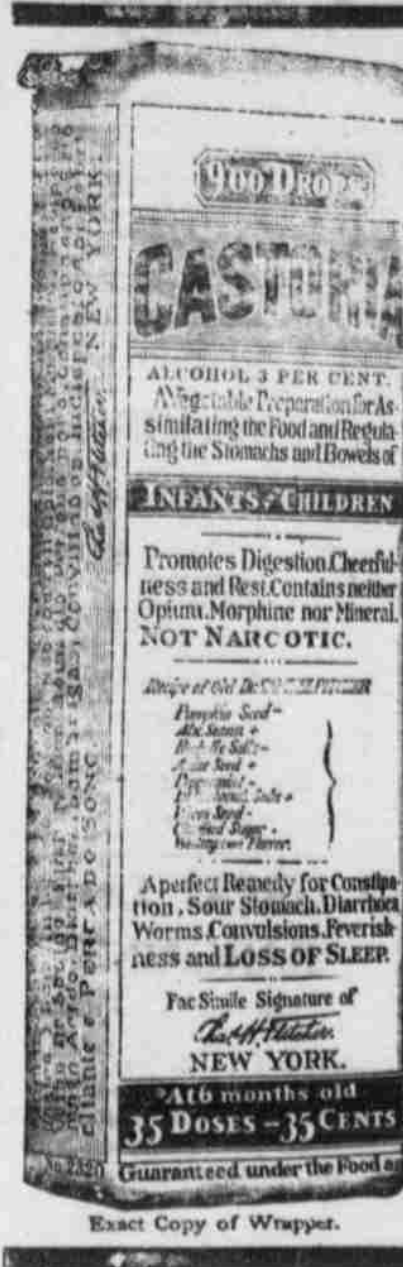
### EASTERN TRUNK LINES START FREIGHT WAR
