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IMPROVE OUR STATE FAIR FACILITIES.

It is up to the people of this city to help make the State Fair a greater success than ever before.

The street car service should be improved so that the thousands of people can be better handled.

The main street to the fair, North Winter street and the Fair Ground road should be heavily sprinkled.

Thousands of vehicles and autos will drive over that road and it should be rolled and wet down and kept clean.

The condition of that street last year through some misunderstanding was not what it should have been.

The whole attention of the street department should be directed to giving the public a clean, dustless, decent street from Salem to the State Fair if we prize that institution.

It is not creditable to our citizens that a fine boulevard has not been built to the State Fair Grounds before this.

But in the absence of that, let us make the only street we have something half way decent and passable.

RAILROAD LAND FRAUDS.

When the suit was brought to cancel the California and Oregon land grant many persons filed on railroad lands.

Since then law firms in Portland have been trying to collect \$100 fees in addition to former payments for defense in the suit.

The Capital Journal is informed that the federal government is prosecuting these cases and all such payments for lawyer fees are unnecessary.

The Capital Journal has warned private citizens against spending money on filing on such claims and must warn them again against this later form of graft.

There is no way to protect people who go after these lands from the rapacity of legal sharks and they are probably justified in collecting all they can from suckers.

The Taft welcome at Portland will be so unanimous and enthusiastic that all such intriguing will be forgotten.

Let us all prepare to make the Taft visit the people's visit, and let national pride and loyalty bury strife over who shall hold his hat or show him the town.

HE SAYS COOK IS A FAKIR

Fred Printz, Guide Who Was With Cook in Alaska, Says He Never Ascended Mt. McKinley.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Hamilton, Mont., Sept. 6.—Fred Printz and Ed. Barrim, well-known guides for Montana and Idaho, are today discrediting the statement of Dr. Frederick A. Cook that he succeeded in reaching the north pole.

According to Printz and Barrim, they acted as guides for Cook in 1905, when the doctor is said to have made ascent of Mount McKinley, although the guides claim the explorer did not place a foot on that mountain. This is the story Printz is telling:

"Barrim and I made two trips to Alaska with Cook, in company with Walter P. Diller, of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, who acted as photographer.

"We made the first trip in 1903, but as it was unsuccessful Dr. Cook arranged to make a second trip the following year. The second trip was made from this side.

"Diller and I were delegated to take a side trip to secure game heads for the Smithsonian Institute. Barrim told me afterwards that Dr. Cook bartered to give him hush money.

"On reaching Seattle the papers were full of Dr. Cook's dope, and a banquet was given in his honor. Diller and I said nothing in contradiction, hoping that by keeping mum he would eventually pay us. In the spring Mr. Diller tried to have Barrim and me make a statement for the purpose of exposing the doctor, but we declined.
